gram members, includes transportation.

As with all day camp programs, registration for one session must be paid in full. A \$10 deposit per session per child will reserve multiple sessions. Full payments per session are due one week in advance. Parents will be billed weekly. Deposits won't be refunded.

In conjunction with this program and Kinder Camp, the Y offers Working Parents Delight, which allows them to drop off their children before the regular program and pick them up later. The program opens 7-9 a.m. and closes 4:30-6:30 p.m. A snack is offered at 4:30 p.m. to children in this program. This is an unstructured time. Children generally sit and talk or occupy themselves with quiet games at the end of the day, according to Brooks.

Those who arrive earlier in the morning can use the Y's gym. Facility members fee is \$10; program members, \$15. Parents must pay the entire fee for this program for all sessions at registration.

Kinder Camp, for children 4½-6 years old who are currently enrolled in kindergarten or will enroll in kindergarten, runs daily from 9 a.m. to 4:30 p.m. in the Y building. Program runs in weekly sessions from June 22 to Aug. 14. Children participate in crafts, songs, games, free play and swimming lessons. There is a daily rest period for all campers.

"They maybe are in day care and kindergarten for a full day. But the camp program is really kind of rigorous and they get tired. In the regular day camp, there's no way to accommodate them," Brooks said.

Children should bring a sack lunch, swim suit and towel each day. Facility members fee, \$50; program members fee, \$70 per session.

Pal Camp, aimed at children, 3-4 years old, is a summer version of the Y's mini critters preschool program. It meets in separate morning and afternoon sessions Monday, Wednesday and Friday and offers a preschool-style program with daily swim lessons. Children should wear swimwear and a towel each day.

Extra care before the program or between the morning and afternoon sessions isn't available.

Morning programs run from 9 a.m. to noon. Afternoon sessions are set 12:30-3:30 p.m. Sessions are weekly beginning June 22 and ending on Aug. 14. Facility members fee is \$38 per two week session; program members pay \$54.

Tot camp, for children 2½-3 years old is offered in a morning session, 9:30-11:30 a.m. and an afternoon program, 12:30-2:30 p.m. Tuesdays and Thursday. Sessions run on a weekly basis beginning June 23 and ending Aug. 13.

Parents ought to be prepared to prove that children under 3 years old have had pre-school experience. Care isn't offered before, after or between the morning and afternoon sessions. Facility members fee, \$16 per two week session; program members fee, \$24.

This program provides a pre-school style class. Swimming isn't included in the tot camp program.
