MARCEAU MARCEAU, universally recognized as the greatest living pantomimist, will offer two performances in Corson Auditorium July 11 and 12. Reserved seat tickets are \$12. Performances will take place at 8 p.m. both days with the addition of a 3 p.m. matinee on Sunday.

Chamber music lovers will want to be in Corson Auditorium July 15 at 8 p.m. when the Emerson String Quartet makes its first appearance at Interlochen. This young, technically brilliant quartet has received kudos from all the major music critics and has appeared on virtually every major series in North America. Reserved seat tickets are \$8.

In the early 1980s Ricky Skaggs decided to go against the pop and crossover trend in country music and play the kind of sound that he liked best, namely old-time country music. He became one of the best-loved musicians in the traditionalist movement and this year won a Grammy for Best Country Instrumental Performance. Kresge reserved seat tickets are priced at \$14, \$12, \$10 for the July 16 at 8 p.m. performance.

THE VAN CLIBURN Benefit Concert is annually one of the most looked-forward-to events on the Interlochen Arts Festival calendar. This summer, Soviet-born pianist and winner of the silver medal in the 1977 Van Cliburn International Piano Competition, Alexander Toradze, returns to Kresge Auditorium for the 25th Van Cliburn Benefit with the World Youth Symphony Orchestra.

Toradze will perform Rachmaninoff's "Concerto No. 3 in D Minor for Piano, Op. 30." Reserved seat tickets for the July 18 at 8 p.m. performance are \$12, \$10 and \$8.

Is there anyone in America who doesn't know Doc Severinsen and the Tonight Show Band? Although the crazy clothes are gone (mostly), the great sound remains, as do the jokes and the fun. Not just the trumpet-playing musical director of the Tonight Show, Severinsen is also an outstanding solo artist and a nightclub star.

Severinsen and the Band won a Grammy this year for the Best Jazz Instrumental Performance in the Big Band Category. Reserved seats in Kresge Auditorium for the July 19 at 8 p.m. performance are \$14, \$12 and \$10.

FOR SOME "HUBBAH-hubbah, creme de la creme, champagne and caviar" dancing, Interlochen suggests the Hubbard Street Dance Company July 21 and 22 at 8 p.m. in Corson Auditorium. The Hubbard is a natty 10-member troupe whose slick theatrical dancing is the hottest performance item in Chicago. Their popular style combines the strength, technique and grace of ballet, the explosive energy of jazz and the rhythmic footwork of tap. Reserved seat tickets are \$10.

The United States Navy's top musical group, the U.S. Navy Band, will offer a free performance in the Interlochen Bowl July 24 at 8 p.m.

On July 31 at 8 p.m., one of the world's most prestigious orchestras comes to Interlochen's Kresge Auditorium. The Chicago Symphony Orchestra is the standard by which many of the world's orchestras are judged. Through its tours and its excellent recordings, the Chicago has built an international reputation which places it among the top six of the world's great orchestras.




