## Police tell sunbathers to beware

Farmington Hills police are on the lookout for a man who has tried to sexually assault women sunbath-ers in the apartment and condomi-nium complexes along 12 Mile

Road.

Three times since May 6, a man has struck up conversations with sunbathers, then pulled down their swinsuit top. He then ran away. A witness to one of the incidents reported seeing a man matching the perpetrator's description run to a hown pickup truck.

Two of the incidents were as Krawberry Lane Apariments. The other was at 12th Estate Condos.

The perpetrator is described as white, heavy set and in his early 20s. He is about 6 feet tall, with a clear complexion and short, straight brown hair. At the time of the incidents, he wore red shorts and approached each victim while they were sunbathing during the early afternoon.

Police have increased patrols along 12 Mile, but they ask "all residents to be particularly alert to any individuals or vehicles which match these descriptions," said Sgt. Charles Nebus of the Farming-ton Hills Police Department Crime Prevention Section.

He urges women residents to re-port any suspicious or unusual ac-tivity to police.

WOMEN ARE urged to make themselves less vulnerable by being cautious and aware of their surroundings at all times. "Be suspicious of strangers who appear out of place or nervous," Nebus said. "If an unknown individual approaches you, maintain your distance."

Personal space of 25 to 50 feet should be used as a cushion be-tween yourself and a possible at-

tacker. Along with space, eye contact with people is important.

"When we look someone in the eye, we deprive them of the element of surprise that most criminals want," Nebus said. "If a stranger persists with idie, unwanted conversation, moves unnecessarily close, or makes you feel uncomfortable, don't hesitate to leave."

The first step in preventing sexual assault is knowing it can happen to anyone, even you. "Trust your intuition." Nebus said. "If you sense something its wrong, you might just be right."
