

# Student From Brazil Boots Bentley To Victory

Doug Jones, a student at Bentley High, has a sense of sizing up good football material. As soon as he saw Moyes Nader, a senior exchange student from Brazil, kick a soccer ball, Jones instantly realized that Nader could help the Bentley football team. Jones quickly rushed over to see Coach Larry Joiner and told him that he had a man who could kick extra points and field goals.

In the need of just such a performer, Joiner dashed over to Nader's classroom and had a little talk with the visitor from South America. It wasn't long before Nader was kicking footballs, instead of soccer balls, and guess who the hero was in Bentley's 14-12 victory over Dearborn Friday?

Right, Mr. Nader.

His two conversions, one each in the second and third quarters, proved the difference

as Bentley twice rallied to pull out the victory -- its second in as many starts.

"What a thrill," Nader explained after beating Dearborn. "I hardly knew there was a game called football before I came to this country a few weeks ago. I never had seen a game, you know."

But Nader has felt right at home with Bentley. In two games he has made five conversions.

"It's sure a break for us that Doug Jones made his discovery," says Joiner.

Bentley resorted to ground tactics to beat Dearborn, piling up 228 rushing and only

44 yards in the air. Dearborn's 235 yards in the game all came on the ground.

DEARBORN WENT ahead in the second period on a 22-yard run by Dan Sadu in the second period.

Bentley tied it on a 55-yard march in which the running of

LeRoy Watson, Tim Malone and Bob Cascaden featured the drive.

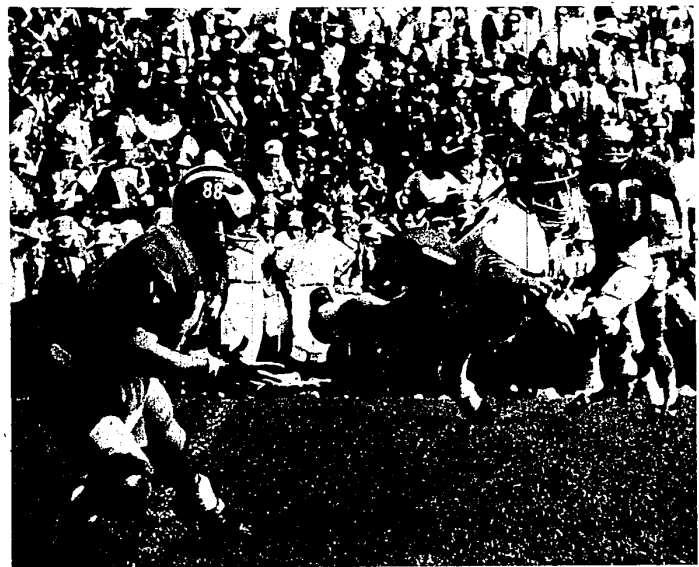
One pass also helped, a 13-yarder, from Bob Walden to Cascaden, on the Dearborn three from where Cascaden went over to tie the score.

Nader then made it 7-6.

But Dearborn went back in

front on a six-yard TD by Mike Kovachewich before Bentley counted again on the running of Watson and Cascaden. Roy Garland finally cracked over from the one for the touchdown. Nader's second conversion followed.

Watson led the winners with 94 yards rushing.

## U-M Anything But Impressive In Defeat

Once mighty Michigan, which in its hey-day gobbled up inter-sectional football foes with a gourmet's delight as appetizers before biting into the Big Ten, will take a hungry belly to Durham, N.C., for a match with surprising Duke Saturday after being hogtied by the University of California, 21-7, in the 1968 opener.

The Wolverines showed little against the Golden Bears which would auger well for the nine weeks ahead.

Their offensive and defensive lines were outmuscled, quarterback Dennis Brown's aerial arm looked like a scattergun as he hit on only nine of 31 tosses, and Michigan's pass receiving brought blushes to those who can think back to

Oosterbaan, Frutig, Ribenburg, Kramer and Clancy.

NOW COACH BUMP Elliott must regroup his troops to invade a traditional stronghold of the Atlantic Coast Conference this week, taking on a Duke 11 which is fresh from a 14-7 upset over Coach Paul Dietzel's University of South Carolina club on the latter's own gridiron.

Duke belied a supposed dearth of talent with the win over the Dietzel forces, and may find the moment ripe for adding tarnish to the inter-sectional halo of Michigan in particular and the Big Ten in general.

Michigan has defeated Duke in all three previous meetings, in 1960, 1961 and 1967. The

score last year was 10-7 as both schools posted 4-6 seasonal records.

However, it also is true that Michigan whipped California the first four times they ever played. Now the Golden Bears have cut it to 4-2 by winning in '67 and last Saturday with a team that is rated in the middle of the pack on the Pacific slope.

California knocked Michigan's ears off in the first quarter and had 14 points on the stadium's new scoreboard before the Wolverines registered a first down.

Halfback Gary Fowler went 13 yards for one score, and then six for the other through a sieve-like Michigan line. Ron Miller kicked both conversions.

Until late in the second quarter the Wolverines did not push beyond their own 41-yard line.

IN THEIR ONE sustained thrust of the day, they then parlayed two completions from Brown to Jim Mandich with good running by Capt. Ron Johnson and Garret Gray to move 59 yards to their only score. Mandich got the TD on an eight-yard pass and Tim Killian converted.

Defensively, Michigan rallied to hold California at bay deep into the second half, but suffered repeated frustrations of its own with dropped passes and blocking miscues.

At the end, it was Michigan which wilted in the high humidity and California toyed with the Wolverine defense in the final five minutes to notch another Fowler tally after a march of 43 yards.

Elliott commented after the game that the Wolverines had hoped to outspeed the ponderous Bears by running wide. California didn't turn out to be that slow, or maybe Michigan isn't that fast. At any rate, it didn't work.

Elliott also said he had thought beforehand that his team could pass against Cal. Pass they did, but hit the target, or catch them, they didn't.

THE FATE OF Jerry Imsland, junior end from Northville, typified the day.

The six-foot-two offensive flanker was in Michigan's starting lineup and during the hour he was the target of six Brown passes.

The first was incomplete and Imsland was called for offensive interference. He dropped the second, the third was intercepted, the fourth was tipped out of reach by a Cal defender, he caught the fifth for a 13-yard gain, and California was guilty of interference on the sixth.

Observant fans better in the colorful Band Day festivities before a throng of 71,866 as musicians from Plymouth, Clarencville, Bentley and Franklin High schools joined with 12,000 bandmen from the largest event of its kind anywhere in the world.

Michigan's next home game will come Oct. 5 against Navy, with Michigan State coming down from East Lansing to launch the conference schedule Oct. 12.

## 3 Passes Produce 3 TDs And Easy Win For East

In the third quarter, Mike Bremner capped a 40-yard march to put East ahead for keeps. Then it was Chute going to the air for his third pass of the game--and his third touchdown.

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That's when the tide of battle quickly shifted and East came on like gangbusters to stay unbeaten. The East team had tied Riverside in the opener.

EAST GAINED 158 yards

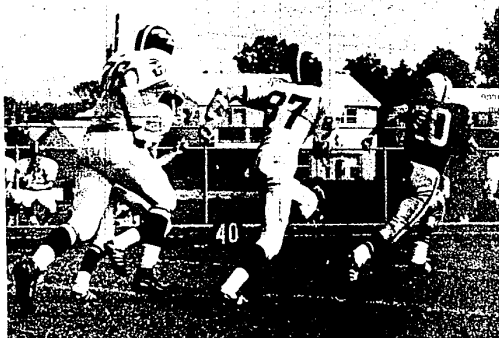
rushing with Wilkinson going for 48 yards by himself.

Pat Moore sparked on defense along with Mike Jedlick, Rick Lipinski, Larry Nault, Rich Lang, Garry Lyman and Rick Orlandini.

## Trojan Gridders Find Statistics Mean Nothing

Nothing can be more misleading in football than statistics.

Consider the first downs recorded in Clarencville High's Wayne-Oakland League football opener with Milford.

Clarencville had 17, Milford four.

The Trojans rushed and passed for 240 yards. But they still couldn't win the game.

Milford walked off the field an easy, 26-7 winner.

There was another statistic which wasn't misleading, however, and helped to explain Clarencville's loss.

The Trojans lost the ball four times on fumbles. On three occasions they gave up the ball inside the Milford 10.

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"YOU CAN'T win 'em that way," said Coach Ralph Weddle of the losers. "It's the worst we've done in the fumbling department since I came here a couple of years ago."

Milford went to the air when it couldn't make much headway through the strong Clarencville line.

Bob Cilnrad quickly shot his team ahead, 13-0, when he flipped to Mark Giegler twice for touchdowns. First it was just for a yard, the second time for 14 yards.

Ron Wellet put Clarencville on the board with a 29-yard gallop after a Bob Riding to Walter pass had clicked for

45 yards.

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MILFORD came right back with a 65-yard march, capped by a 24-yard scoring run by Larry Vick to make it 20-7 at halftime.

Then it was Cilnrad to Giegler again on a play covering 52 yards for the final touchdown.

"We'll have to spend a great deal of time working on our pass defense," explained Coach Weddle.

"That's where they hurt us with two long bombs for over 50 yards each."

Dave Brandemuhl accounted for the lone Clarencville extra point.
