THE BILL was amended to apply to all private schools and not just re-ligous schools. It would permit school officials to declare their insti-

ligious schools. It would permit is tool officials to declare their institutions free of state supervision. An amendment would designate an ordained minister as a teacher quantified to teach children at the schools.

"We are saying that they can have teachers who have none of these

skills," Sederburg said. "That adds up to a glant mistake." According to Schwarz, chairman of the committee which approved the bill, about 30,000 children in church-based schools in Michigan would be affected by the bill. He said about 205,000 children attend pri-vate schools in Michigan.
