Before the decision was made not to file a lawsuit with circuit court, Levy had obtained two affidavits signed by Republican voters who were not able to split their tickets to vote for Levy.

Confidential sources from both parties in the township have analyzed the returns Tuesday and have seen a trend where independent vot-ers were choosing Democrat Levy and Republican Stader in the Yrustee race.

Levy reports he has re-ceived dozens of calls from residents who were refused the opportunity to split their tickets. "Most of these per-sons I have never met before but they called because they tried to vote for me and couldn't."

Some voters were told what the problem was and were then told by election workers that one vote wouldn't make a difference, claims Levy.

LEVY SAYS he has talked with Township Clerk Floyd Cairns and asked several questions but could not get satisfactory answers.

Cairns reports that most voting machines were out of order before 10 a.m., Levy says, but did not have a record of what time each machine was repaired at each precinct.

He noted that he ended up closer to the Republican can-didates for trustee than any Democrat has for many years in trustee contests.

ONE OF THE affidavits signed was by a Republican who reports Levy was the only Democrat he wanted to vote for on the ballot but was unable to pull the lever.

Township Democrats are considering the alternative of a sking that a new election be held for trustee. The Democrats feel the machines should have been shut down until repaired and paper ballots provided.
