Franklin Tops Churchill, 7-0

The jolt was a heavy one for Franklin High's football team on opening night in September. Although highly touted, Franklin was beaten at Cente' Line.

Then followed a victory and then another defeat. So after three games, Franklin was 1-2 overall and 0-1 in the Northwest Suburban League.

THEN THE FORTUNES of Franklin took an upswing. Five straight victories and a game win on Saturday with a 7-0 win over Churchill in the first collision on the gridiron between the two Livonia schools.

There were a variety of reasons for the roaring Franklin windup: One had to be the play of

junior back John Piippo. When the season started he was on the reserves. Three games went by before he got his chance on the varsity. He would up with more than 800 yards in gains and a 6 1/2-yard average.

Another reason: two-way tackle Jim Craig, easily the finest linemen in the league. Just ask the coaches. There were other strengths

— like Chuck Clark, Mike Graham, Mike Lynch, Don Opland and Mark Lichto. "We just started to jell and came along fast," said Coach George Loviet.

CHURCHILL CAUSED Franklin a great many problems.

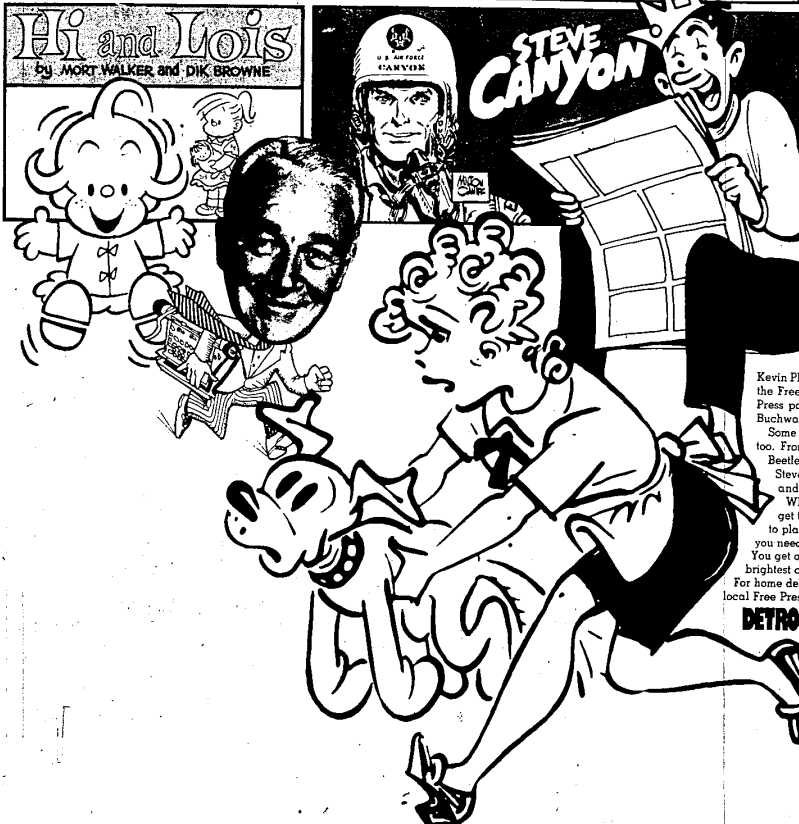
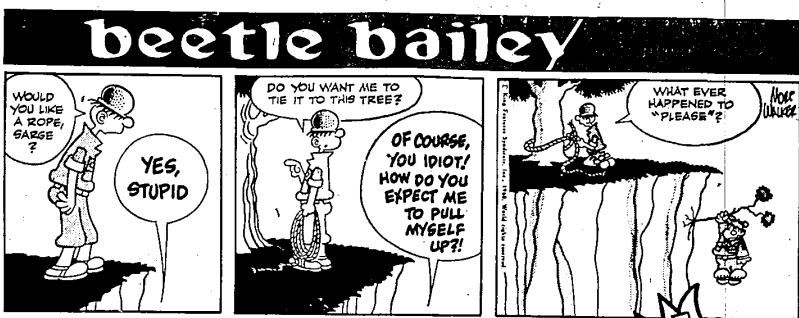
Churchill came within four yards of scoring in the sec-

ond period on a 43-yard march to the Franklin four. But there the Franklin line stiffened and turned Churchill back.

A pass interception by Dave Mager on the Churchill 35 led to the game's only touchdown. Franklin marched in and scored on John Casey's two-yard buck. Mike Lynch booted the extra point.

Churchill, led by backs Jerry Oljace and Evan Smith, had 12 first downs to Franklin's seven.

Franklin had a 115-94 edge in rushing as Steve Floyd led the way with 59 yards in 11 carries. In passing Churchill notched 10 out of 23 for 76 yards while Franklin managed only two out of six for 16 yards.
