Plans For 70s Are Discussed

As a goal for the 70s, the Michigan Cancer Foundation is working toward prevention and treatment of cancer. This program was discussed at the 17th annual Leadership Training Conference of the MCF in Lansing, at the Kellogg Center on the Michigan State University campus.

Among the delegates were Mrs. Louis Dely of the Plymouth branch and Mrs. James Jahn of the Livonia branch.

PREVENTION of cancer will be the result of scientific research and education of the public, Mrs. Dely and other volunteers were told.

Dr. Michael Brennan, president of the foundation, discussed recent findings in mammary cancer. These concern virus particles in the milk of certain nursing mothers.

Dr. Brennan said, "If milk from these women can be collected and this micro-

copic virus isolated and raised in large quantities in tissue culture, by analyzing the virus chemically and by

using drugs or other agents against the virus, a vaccination or cure for breast cancer can be devised.

Blood Tests To Search Out 'Hidden' Diabetics

Free blood-screening tests to detect diabetes will be available here during the week of Nov. 16 to 21 as part of the search for the more than 100,000 "hidden" diabetics in Michigan.

Sponsored by the Michigan Diabetes Association (MDA), a United Fund agency, Diabetes Week is sponsored nationally by the American Diabetes Association.

Co-sponsors in Michigan are 55 Michigan hospitals, county medical societies, and the Michigan Department of Public Health.

Plymouth General Hospital Laboratory, 15361 Plymouth Road, Detroit, Nov. 16 through 20 from 10 a.m. to 2 p.m.

Redford Community Hospital Laboratory, 25210 Grand River, Detroit, Nov. 16 through 20, from 9:30 a.m. to 2 p.m.

Persons planning to be tested are advised to have a meal rich in sugars and starches two hours before testing, to ensure the most accurate result, and are asked to bring the name and address of their physician if follow-up is necessary.

According to Dr. James J. Aiuto, chairman of the MDA diabetes detection committee, those who are over 40 weigh more than they should, and have a family history of diabetes are especially urged to be tested.

"A 'hidden' diabetic is a person who has the condition but is unaware of it," explained Dr. Aiuto. He said that a person may have the disorder and not know it.

However, the presence of diabetes may be indicated by excessive thirst, excessive urination, loss of weight, itching, constant hunger, easy tiring, slow healing of cuts and scratches and changes in vision.

ANYONE, EVEN children, may develop diabetes, Dr. Aiuto noted. But adults over 40 are leading candidates, especially when they are overweight.

Neglect of diabetes, on the other hand, may lead to increased risk of coronary disease, hardening of the arteries, kidney disease, failing eyesight, gangrene and diabetic coma.

"Though there is as yet no cure for diabetes, today's treatment methods can help control it," Dr. Aiuto said.

Diabetes can be controlled by diet, exercise, and when necessary, insulin or one of the oral compounds that reduce blood sugar. A planned diet is basic to successful control of diabetes.

Good tests need not be expensive.
