### 'Young Guide' Appraiser Is Uninhibited Available At Show

A group of students has given a new look to guide books which might lead you to "some of the best pizza you've ever eaten."

The students are almost all from Wayne State University, and they have called their book "Detroit, a Young Guide to the City." It is currently on sale in local book stores, including Hudson's and the Little Professor Book Centers in Observeland.

In fact, it was a Little Professor sales girl who reported that a casual perusal of the restaurants section led her to an upstairs restaurant on the east side, with the great pizza.

THE BOOK is the brainchild of Wayne post-graduate student, Sheldon Annis, and was designed to be a young and "uninhibited" look at the city.

It's also an entertaining way to find out what Detroit has to offer for entertainment, both cultural and non-cultural.

The authors printed it themselves under the name of "Speedball Publications," and they are just about to print their second edition, so quickly is the first going. Hudson's Westland reported this week that they were sold out (more are on order). Interest extends even to Plymouth, Detroit's westernmost suburb, where it has been re-ordered several times.

although written with a good deal more history, social commentary and opinions.

OTHER UNUSUAL chapters are "The Hip Underground," more an editorial than a guide, and "The Car Culture," which gives advice on buying a car. "No one is honest when selling a car," says the book.

Sports are well covered with one whole chapter devoted to skiing, not in downtown Detroit, but on nearby slopes.

There's even some advice on foreign travel. Students from the University of Windsor collaborating on the book have given a capsule course in Canadian government and Ontario liquor laws — "the most confusing in the world" — for visitors to Windsor.

Even if you have to stay at home, you're not looking for a psychoanalyst for your dog or you don't need a rare old book for Aunt Minnie's Christmas present, a "Young Guide" makes interesting reading.

Theme of the show is "Give an antique for Christmas."




