In October 1955, Gilels made his American debut. He was the first major Soviet musician to play to audiences in the United States since Sergei Prokofiev in the 1920s. Gilels was heard by packed houses in New York, Philadelphia, Boston, Chicago and Cleveland.

Since then, he has returned to America on an average of every two years.
