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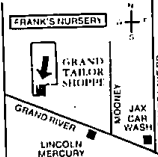
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Lecture addresses parenting as vital social component

More and more the failure of the family to care for children properly is being blamed for many of society's ills: the crime rate, drug and child abuse, poverty.

Concerned about the challenges within the family, members of the local Christian Science Church have invited Emily B. Wood to speak to the community. Her subject is "Quality Parenting: A Spiritual Approach."

The free, hour-long public lecture will begin at 8 p.m. Thursday, Oct. 22, in First Church of Christ, Scientist, 33825 Grand River in Farmington.

A CHRISTIAN Science practitioner, as well as a grandmother, Wood believes that human parenting is most responsible, effective and nurturing when it is shaped by a deepening understanding of "our common parent, our Father-Mother God," she

said. As the lecturer sees it, God's "motherhood and fatherhood" are expressed in his tenderness, love, wisdom, protection and in all his good care of his children, qualities that parents can express.

Understanding God better, she said, helps teach how to take better care of our children.

"Parenting really is caring," she said. "An awareness of others based on some understanding of God's aliveness and goodness and his love for all of his children is an activity that never ends."

"Beyond the way we take care of our children, how we guard them, protect them, guide them, parenting is a form of caring for our children and all others that is essential for every human being to express, whether or not they have children."

During her lecture Wood will cite instances that illustrate how under-

standing God and one's relation to him has blessed and unified families.

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
