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## Pumpkins 'n' spice 'n' everything nice

Halloween marks the traditional opening of the pumpkin season. Everyone knows the fun of carving a pumpkin into a Jacko-Jantern, and they've become traditional musts for settire fall decorations. See the full section of the second traditional musts for this attractive vegetable is in the many pumpkin desects and other dishes that we've learned to make," sayd Linda Cornell, Oakland County home economist.

To buy, select a pumpkin that is heavy for its size. The rind should be smooth and free from spots or discolarations. Very large pumpkins often have stringy, coarse flesh and arteless weet. Pumpkins will keep two or three months if stored at 50 degrees with a 70 percent humidity.

To prepare, halve, remove seeds and stringy portion. Carefully wash pumpkin seeds to remove the cling-life flibrous pumpkin tissue. Seeds can be oven tried at 150 degrees for one to two hours. Stir frequently to prevent scorehing. Roast dried pumpkin seeds by Isssing them lightly with oil and sait and placing them in a preheated oven at 250 degrees

for 10 to 15 minutes.

To cook pumpkin in water, eul haives into small picces, then pare, add pumpkin to small picces, then pare, and pumpkin to small smount of boiling water and cover. Simmer, gently for 25 to 30 minutes or mall tender. Drain well and put through steve or blender to the pumpkin in halves for quarters and ceronove seeds. Place cut side down in a shallow pan and take in 350-degree oven for one hour until pumpkin becomes tender and begins to fall apart. When cool enough to handle, scrape the pulp from the shell and put through a sieve or blender.

To freeze, cook and pack into airtight freezer jars or freezer contain-tight but the salt and apperent to serve pumpkin as a vegetable. To serve pumpkin as a vegetable, cason with butter, salt and pepper. For a dessert, use in piex tarts, cakes, cookies or breads.
