

SC avenges soccer loss

Call Saturday's game a college job. What Schoolcraft College's men's soccer team salvaged was a measure of respect with its 1-0 victory over Eastern Michigan University. The team won 3-1 in the conference. The Owls are 2-1 in the conference. Macomb CC is 3-1. Each has two league games left.

Harrison's Davidson state finalist

Farmington Harrison girls tennis coach Bernie Goldstein predicts a bright future for Kori Davidson as a high school player.

And well he should after the Harrison freshman advanced to the No. 1 singles final in Saturday's Class B meet at Eastern Michigan University.

Davidson may have to wait for Dearborn High's Susan Somerville to graduate to realize her highest dreams, but she is already among the state's best.

In a repeat of their regional final contest, Somerville, a junior, defeated Davidson 6-1, 6-4 for the state championship after the Harrison star eliminated her first three opponents in consecutive two-set matches.

In Class A tennis, Farmington Mercy's Nicole Transou won two matches at No. 1 singles and advanced to the quarterfinals before being eliminated by the eventual winner, North Farmington qualified as a team for state competition, but the Raiders won only one doubles match.

DAVIDSON finished the season

21-4, losing twice to both Carrie Cunningham of Livonia Churchill, who is ranked No. 1 in the country, and Somerville, the Class B champ.

"She will, I think, win the state once, maybe twice, before she's through," said Goldstein, noting the 80-pound Davidson will get bigger and stronger in the next few years.

"Right now she's still a little girl. She's playing girls two and three years older than her — and playing them very even."

After drawing a first-round bye, Davidson blanked Lynn Harding of Gull Lake 6-0, 6-0 and, in her next match, whipped Andi Tasker of team champion East Grand Rapids 6-1, 6-1.

EGR has long had one of the state's top tennis programs and has won several back-to-back state titles. "So beating their top player had to be a good win," Goldstein said.

IN THE semifinals, Davidson went up against Ludington's Rachel Jensen, also a nationally ranked player. But Davidson, ranked No. 1 by the Southeastern Michigan Tennis Association, No. 3 by a Midwest tennis organization and among the top 20 nationally in girls 14, posted a 6-2, 6-3 victory.

"She was very afraid of playing Jensen, but Kori beat her very easily," Goldstein said. "It was just a one-sided match."

"I expected a three-setter going in, and Kori just played very well."

Davidson comes from a family with a tennis reputation. Her sister played No. 1 singles for the Hawks and was a three-time state semi-finalist, and her brother played No. 1 singles for the boys team.

"(Kori) is going to be the best of the three," Goldstein said. "She's already gone farther than either one of them."

TRANSOU, a sophomore, ran up against Midland Dow's Meredith McGrath in the quarters and lost 6-1, 6-2. McGrath, the defending champion, upset Cunningham in the semi-

nals and knocked off Bloomfield Hills' Elizabeth Nau in the final.

"I think (Transou) played well against McGrath," Mercer coach Jim Kerwin said. "McGrath is a forceful player, and she reminded me of Martina (Navratilova) in mannerisms and attacking style of play."

"But Nicole played well. The score doesn't indicate how well she played, but several games were deuce games. The play was better than what it looks like."

Cunningham was seeded No. 1, Rochester Adams' Amy Frazier No. 2, McGrath No. 3, Nau No. 4 and Transou No. 8. Nine players were seeded.

Transou needed three sets to defeat Scarlett Chorvat of Fraser 6-2, 4-6, 6-2 in her first match before eliminating Angie Reyes of Flint Powers 6-2, 6-1 in the next round.

"THE FIRST match was a good match," Kerwin said. "(Transou) had

a little bit of a letdown in the second set, and that's why it went three. But she was able to get herself back together and win the third quite easily."

"If she continues to progress the way she has the over last two years, she'll be right up there with the best of them," he added.

North's No. 1 doubles team of Pam Gressler and Carrie Lee won its first match, defeating West Bloomfield's Dana Jaffe and Jennifer Beebe 6-1, 7-5. They went out in the next round, losing to the second-seeded team from Okemos (Jana Tartaglione and Debbie Zurehauer), 6-4, 6-1.

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
