The first battle of the Great
Lakes Intercollegiate Athletic Conference women's tennis season has
been waged. No. 2 will be fought
prior to the start of the final — and
most important — engagement,
which will decide who is the
league's best.

And that's a title Oakland University has never won, a title it covets jealously.

The opening conflict was the
dual-meet season. OU fared well,
capturing eight of nine meets. But
its only loss was a strategic disaster — the Lady Pioneers were
thumped by detending
Champion Ferris State 9-0.

Still, that was just one round.

And, as OU coach Jim Pinchoff put it, "Funny things can happen. Who can say?"

THAT'S BECAUSE two rounds still must be played. FSC is bound to fare well in the second round—seeding for the conference tournament—because it is unbeaten in

seeding for the conference tourna-ment — because it is unbeaten in GLIAC play. But that doesn't count OU out. The Lady Ploneers will be seeded second in at least four of nine matches, and could be seeded sec-ond in as many as seven entering the GLIAC tourney this weekend at the Midiand Tennis Center. Seeding is extremely important.

FSC has the top seeds in all nine
events (six singles and three douless). By getting the second seed,

only the top two positions earn seeds. The rest are seeded by draw. OU's best chance to win a GLIAC title is in first doubles with Marge Messbarger and Kris Jeffery. The twosome had an 8-1 record, their only loss coming in three sets to Ferris' Kathleen Watch and Dlane Makonana.

"THEY HAD Ferris at match point and lost," said Pinchoff of his first doubles tandem. "They didn't really play all that well, either. I think they'll beat (FSC) them this

weekend."
Others guaranteed of a No. 2 seed for OU are the No. 3 doubles team of Kelly Hayden and Lori-Kiffner, No. 2 singles Messbarger and No. 6 singles Kiffner, No. 1 singles Jeffery, No. 3 singles Heather Duncan (from Southfield and Birmingham Marian) and No. 5 singles Hayden all have 7-2 records and could also earn second seeds.
