Election nears City candidates debate quality of life

As the Tuesday, Nov. 3, general election approaches, residents in both Parmington and Farmington Hills are preparing to head for the polls to III scals on their respective cluy councils. In Parmington Hills, the race is on. Nine are yving for four scats, with three incumbents running. The top three (inclusters will earn four-year terms, the next highest finisher a two-year term.

The race is not as hot in Farming-ton, where three incumbents are running for an equal number of scats. There is slight competition, however, as the two top votegetiers in the council race will receive four-year terms; the one receiving the least amount of votes will be re-elected for just two years. Mayor William Hartsock and councilmen Richard Tupper and Raiph Yoder are the three candi-dates.

As part of the Observer election coverage, candidates were asked to respond to questionnaires involving city issues. While most of the Parmi-ington responses were run in an ear-lier issue, candidates also responded to questions involving traffic conges-tion and quality of life in the city of Farmington. Their answers appear below:

What can the city do to alleviate growing traffic congestion on Grand River?

Hartsock: "We have looked at it and we have tried different things. Because of the physical space limi-tations, there's just very little we can do. The most abvious answer is you have parking or don't have park-ing on Grand River. I don't think there's any one single thing we can do to alleviate that problem." Voder: "Traffic congestion on Grand River could be alleviated by the elimination of parking on Grand River. However, strong arguments could be made for or against such a measure. The installation of a signal at Grove Street in the near future should provide for better pedestrian
