THE CITY'S proposal that will be given to developers will include six criteria that interested developers will be required to meet: • The property must be devel-oped for schior adult housing. • The project must conform to he city's current Rc1 zoning, as well as fire and building codes for elderly housing.

well as fire and building codes tor elderiy housing. • Farmington Hills residents must receive priority in occupying the rental units. Parents of Farming-ton Hills residents must receive sec-ond priority. • The developer must present the city with a rental schedule outlining

rent for a five-year period beginning with the first day of occupancy. • All engineering requirements must be met. THE COMMITTEE of city repre-ntatives reviewing developers

THE COMMITTEE of city repre-sentatives reviewing developers' proposals will further consider an-other four criteria. They include, a provision for transportation assis-ance, social or recreational activi-ties and facilities, medical assis-ance, ability to expand the acreage for an even larger housing facility that can be developed and other "senior related amenities." Birkhoir said in the report. Interested developers will be re-quired to present a two-litered pro-
