Rockin' Our Roles

1-day conference on later-day changes for the working woman

"Rockin' Our Roles: The Changing Roles of Women" has been prepared by Womencenter to run from 9 a.m. to 4 p.m. Saturday, Nov. 7, on the Orchard Ridge Campus, Oakland Community College.

The conference was designed for the working woman who has seen major shifts in the work force and in the economy, as well as the impact of the women's movement over the past 20 years. Those shifts have resulted in women re-thinking the roles defined for her by a traditional society.

Participants will have a choice of attending three morning sessions and three afternoon sessions for \$10. The fee for seniors and students is \$7. The cafeteria is not open on Saturday, so participants are asked to bring their own bag lunch.

women are in the labor force, some pushed there by rising divorce rates, growing unemployment, inflation and the heightened career aspirations of modern women.

Only 10 percent of American households are presently headed by a father as a sole breadwinner. The majority of American families are headed by a single female who lives at the poverty level.

NOW activist Carol King, administrative assistant to Detroit councilwoman Mary Ann Mahaffey, will open the conference with a talk on "A Feminist Agenda for the Workplace: The Right to a Living Wage."

Her talk will be followed by workshops in which participants can explore creative ways to define their roles to fit the reality of their lives.

SISTER ROSE Kopszenski will be the presenter for "Mentoring and Networking."

"Men have been mentoring since the days of apprenticeship. It's training from within, one helping another from his little circle to step up from

inside. It's a good system. Women are beginning to be chosen to move up by men, but never mentored," said Sister Rose, who is the campus minister and editor of the campus newspaper.

"I think mentoring might be my forte. I listen well. I can pinpoint a problem then give a direction for you to move forward. I think I was mentoring before I realized what it was. A mentor is not a lifelong friend. A mentor gives you so you can move up and away and beyond. Now women are seeking mentors to move forward in the company, forward in the profession," she said.

Mentoring ties in with networking by knowing the job, the groundwork, the system and how it works and how to pull all the pieces together to

make a connection and make it work for the women who want to move up.

"Child Care in the Workplace" will be presented by Marilyn Levin, director of program development for the Merrill Palmer Institute. The institute has acted as consultant as well as initiated child care programs in educational institutions, hospitals and industry.

"Choosing-Changing Careers" will be presented by Noreen Ruehs. She will tell her audience how to choose a career rather than let chance do it for them.

"REFORMING and Transforming the White Male Workplace System" will be presented by Pat Angier. She will tell her audience how to learn

the political game and then keep from buying into the male system. "Financial Planning for Women" will be presented by Isabel Francis Smith, a certified financial planner.

"Financial planning is for everybody," said Mary White, director of

Womencenter. "This segment will cover the entire range of finances, from the woman who wants to better learn how to stretch a meager budget for her home to those at the other end of the scale who want to plan for a retirement of traveling."
