Former Refusenik visits Adat Shalom

Rabbi Leonid Feldman, called "a living example of the drama of modern Jewish history," will participate in a weekend of activities at the Adat Shalom Synagogue Friday and Saturday, Oct. 30-31.

Rabbi Feldman was once a Russian youth, barely aware that he was Jewish. Later he experienced violent anti-Semitism and imprisonment as a Zionist activist. As a free man, in June 1987, he became the first Soviet Jew to be ordained a Conservative Rabbi.

At 8 p.m. Friday, Adat Shalom will host a City Wide Oneg Shabbat, where Rabbi Feldman will address youth from the Conservative, Re-

form and Zionist Movements and from B'nai B'rith. The youngsters will meet in Shiffman Chapel to hear Rabbi Feldman discuss "Moscow Does Not Believe in Visas: A Personal Portrait of a Soviet Refusenik."

At Shabbat Morning Services Saturday Rabbi Feldman will deliver the sermon "From Marx to Moses: A Personal Odyssey of Refusenik."

Immediately after, a luncheon and dialogue has been designed for Adat Shalom B'nai Mitzvah and confirmation candidates and their families.
