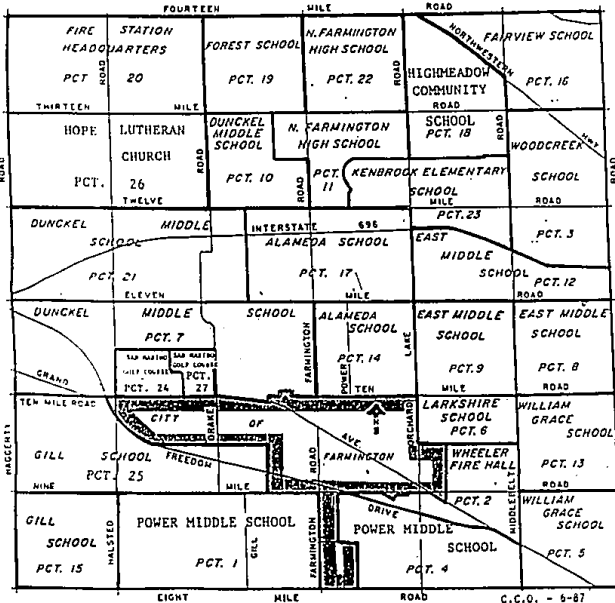


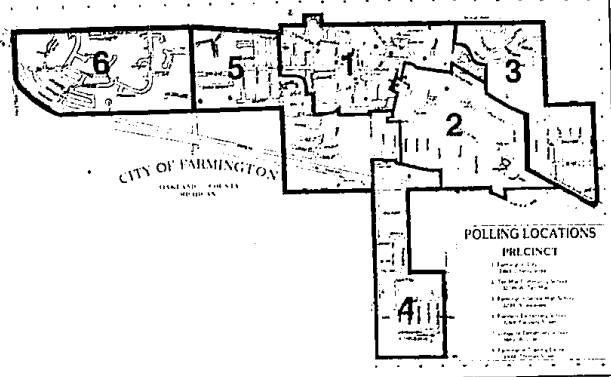
CITY OF FARMINGTON HILLS

Residents to cast ballots tomorrow

Sever, 37, Alkateeb and Dudley have each served two four-year terms non-consecutively. Sever is completing his first two-year term. Councilman Donn Wolf, whose second four-year term is expiring, is not seeking re-election.

Opposing the incumbents are council-watcher Aldo Vagnoni, 61, city-activist Jean Fox, 70, and political newcomers Vernon Klepinski, 33; Raymond Cassar, 28; Richard Lytwynuk, 49; and John Heenan, 50.

Hills council members receive \$1,800 annually for their part-time service. The mayor, elected by fellow council members, receives \$2,700. Election of the mayor and mayor pro tempore is scheduled for later this year.

Two Farmington Hills voting precincts — 24 and 27 — have both moved to the San Marino Golf Course clubhouse, 26634 Halsted, south of 12 Mile.

Precinct 24 previously was at Independence Green clubhouse, precinct 27 at the Universalist Unitarian Church.

BOARD OF COMMISSIONERS

The 21st County Commission District covers part of Southfield and a southeast portion of Farmington Hills.

Running in tomorrow's primary race are Southfield Democrats Eric Coleman, 44, Lillian Jeffe Oaks, 71, and Lew Barnett, 75.

Coleman is a Southfield school trustee, Jaffe Oaks a former city councilwoman and Barnett a mechanical engineering consultant.

Tuesday's winner will face Republican candidate Douglas Sokolowski, 25, also of Southfield, in the Dec. 8 election.

FARMINGTON CITY COUNCIL

Three longtime councilmen, William Hartsock, 36, Richard Tupper, 54, and Ralph Yoder, 61, are making another run for the city council.

Yoder has served on the council for 22 years, Hartsock for 14 and Tupper for a total of 12 non-consecutive years.

All three have served in the post of mayor.

Farmington council members receive \$900 per year for their part-time service to the city. As in Farmington Hills, the mayor is elected by fellow council members.

POLLS IN both cities are open 7 a.m. to 8 p.m. All voters who registered by Oct. 5 may vote in the non-partisan elections.

Absentee ballots — which had to be requested by last Saturday — may be returned to the city clerks until the polls close Tuesday. In emergency cases, residents may vote in person today at their city hall.

Winners in both cities will take their seats at the next regularly scheduled council meeting following the election and certifying by the local boards of canvassers.

Farmington Hills canvassers Janet Courcy, Marion McCoy, Patricia Blackard and George Portner are expected to meet the day after the election to certify results.

Farmington canvassers Michael Brishgold, Thomas Carr, Helen Durham and Charles Wisinger are scheduled to meet Saturday, Nov. 7.
