While resources among the organizations remain available, they are not plentiful, said the Rev. Arthur Spatford, pastor at First United Methodist Church in Farmington.

"There is enough duplication taking place to convince me that we have to do something," he said. The Farmington Area Goodfellows, which serves both Farming-ton and Farmington Hills, provided food, toys, clothing and glit certificates to 177 families last year. That figure included aid to 430 children and 112 senior citizens. According to Tupper, the Goodfellows serves the majority of recipients during the holiday season but provides aid throughout the year to people who show a true need.

The Farmington Hills Salvation Army provided aid to 1,164 people in the area last year.

DAN POTTER, Farmington Hills special services director, of-fered to help create a llaison be-tween the city and the charitable organizations, provided the city council agrees.
