Redford Catholic Central continued its mastery over Dearborn Fordson in the state football playoffs, pounding out a 14-7 victory Saturday over the host Tractors before an overflow crowd. It was the third meeting between the two schools, CC beat the Tractors in 1979 en route to the state Class A title and again in 1985. Both teams lived up to the pre-game hype, each displaying hard-hitting defenses with run-oriented offenses.
