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Grads see value of degree

But WSU survey warns of 'overinflating'

More high school students and older adults are beginning to realize the value of a college education, says a Wayne State University official.

John Crusco, placement services director, based his conclusion on a five-year comparative study of WSU graduates from 1981 to 1985.

The first such survey conducted by Crusce was needed to look at the students and determine their needs. The survey looked at the types of jobs the graduates took, salaries, job preparation and overall satisfaction.

THE RESULTS held a few sur-prises, Crusoe sald.

The general makeup of the gradu-ates had changed, he found.

"There was a tendency for graduates to be both younger and older,"
Crusoe sald. "That means we were attracting both the traditional student, the 18-year-old who goes to school right from high school, and the non-traditional student, adults

over 35."
Crusoe sald the increase in the older students may be a result of economics. "They may have felt they needed more education after confronting their economic situation," he speculated.
They realized the importance of a college education, and that may be

the reason for the increase in tradi-tional students. "The greater num-ber may be part of the realization among young people that unless one has a college degree, one has less of a chance for significant employ-ment," Crusoe said.

BUT HERE'S a danger of overin-flating the value of a college degree. Some students entering WSU may believe that a degree automatically entitles them to a high paying job. During hard economic times, that is not necessarily true, Cruseo ented. "Many college grads may still have unrealistically high expecta-tions," he said. "When they take a job with long hours and lower pay, they may wonder why they could not

have gotten that job right out of hgh school and not gone to college.
"But what they fall to realize is employers are hiring college graduates, and those high school graduates are out of luck."
Crusce said he would like to do more "reality counseling" so there would be less job dissatisfaction among the graduates.

THE SURVEY revealed WSU graduates did better during the 1981-83 recession than the general population of southeastern Michigan.
During this period, WSU graduates had an unemployment rate that was 42-53 percent less than the area average.

"This may have resulted from the

kind of professional employment they tended to seek, as well as an ability to accept employment, when necessary, which might be less de-manding of their skills or time." Crusoc said. Individual surveys are conducted each year, and the resulting statis-tics are used for accreditation visits or self-analysis among the schools and colleres.

This was the first five-year study that gave an overall picture of graduates during the half decade.
THIS COMPARATIVE study gave some insight into the demands of the job market through the salary survey.

For example, the salary increase was lower for industrial engineers. "That was surprising in a manufacturing state like Michigan." Crusoe sald.

This may indicate a trend, he said, of employers looking at a manufacturing plant as a whole system. There may be more mechanical and electrical engineers being hired at a higher rate of pay who are designia and analyting the whole plant.

This may provide a signal for close look at the industrial engineering curriculum in order to ensure it meets the needs of the market place. Crusoe said.



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
