Heftier Hawks have to contend with quicker foe

Farmington Hills Harrison will enjoy a size advantage when it takes un Maryaville in the semifinal round of the Class B football playofs Saturday, but that doesn't necessarily mean the Hawks will have an edge over their opponent. Harrison will have to rely on more than the assumption it can push the smaller Viking around. Ceach Wall Braun has built a program at Maryaville that rivals the one coach John Herrington has established at Harrison, and the tournament-tough Vikings have not won without talent.

Most of the Vikings who play on the front lines are in the 170-pound range. Yet the offensive line, led by All-State guard Matt Gresell (5-9) 170), is considered the strength of the Marysville team. The biggest player is tight end Mike Quilana (6-2, 215), who is an ex-tackle and an oftensied receiver.

"They execute very well because the head coach is also the line coach, and they pride themselves on accom-plishing things up there," Harrison defensive coordinator Bob Sutter said.

BESIDES BEING quick, the Vik-ings also have emphasized proper technique under Braun's tutelage. That has gone a long way toward overcoming lack of size. "Size is not that important," Herr-ington said. "They're fast and strong, and it could be a disadvantage to us that they're smaller."

Marysville has been outsized in most of its playoff games, but the Vikings have used their quickness on detection and "fly to the football," according to a source who has seen them play.

The Vikings play a 5-2 defense and are led by All-State linebacker Jeff Patterson, the biggest defender at 5-10, 190 pounds, with 125 tackles.

"We've got to make sure we lock
on to them, so they don't angle and
get away from us." Herringion said.

"We have a tenacious defense that
has kept us in every game, an excellent offensive line that has enabled
us to move the ball and we have a
fine kicking game," Braun said.

FURTHERMORE, Marysville is entirely a two-platoon team, and that might be the biggest factor in its success. Delton, the Vikings' most recent playoff foe, played nearly 10 players both ways.

But the Hawks are close enough to being a two-platoon squad, also. Cen-ter Chris Cox, guard Jim Fowlkes and end Chad Burgess are the only ones who play defense regularly.

Emotion is certain to play a major role in this game, presumably more so than Harrison's first two playoff encounters since the Hawks have the chance to avenge last year's 22-6 loss to the Vikings.

"It'll be a big factor," Herrington said. "You have two well-known Class B programs. It means a lost salewide and, of course, there's a trip to the Silverdome at stake.
