Walled Lake voters renew millage

Walled Lake School District vot-ers overwhelmingly approved a millage renewal in an election Nov. 16.

Yes votes numbered 1,871 to 646 against. Only 2,517 of an estimated

40,000 registered voters in the district cast votes.

On the ballot was renewal of 15 mills (\$15 per \$1,000 of assessed property value) for operating exproperty value) for operating ex-penses for 10 years.

The renewal represented two

separate taxes which expire at the end of 1987, a 10-year, 10-mill levy and a 5-mill, 5-year levy. The combined renewal represents 34.6 percent of the present operating budget, an amount in excess of \$14 million.
