In 1987-88, Farmington Hills ex-pects to receive \$3.4 million in state money, based on the 1980 population. State shared revenues represent 16 percent of the city's current \$21.4 million budget.

FARMINGTON HILLS officials were certain they wouldn't receive increased payments this year because the census results weren't certified until after July 1 — the start of the new budget year.

But officials expected the supplemental payments beginning July 1, 1988. Unlike many other communities, however, Farmington Hills budgeted a minimum \$50,000 for the census rather than pay with the expected state shared revenues. Communities have sent resolutions to the governor urging him to release the supplemental money. In addition to Farmington Hills, other affected Oxford County communities include West Bloomfield Tommunities include Misson, Rochester Hills and Bingham Farms.

Your stiffness and pain may be extreme, but in arthritis, changes in the bones are subtle and slow. Reliance on x-ray at this time creates a talse sense that "nothing is wrong," or that your pain is more mental than physical.
X-ray is indicated whenever there is a question of the soverity of the arthritis. If you have not responded to therapy as expected, or if your limits are greater than exemination of your joints seems to indicate, then it is time to obtain joint x-rays. Taking reentgenograms periodically and comparing the results with old films, is also reasonable.
