GUARD ASSAULTED

A 21-year-old security guard from Detroit was ordered at gunpoint to lie on the ground after he confronted a man trying to steal a 1983 Ford Mustang from Tom Holzer Ford, 49300 10 Mile, Dec. 4.

According to a Farmington Hills police report:

After hearing noise coming from the area of the car at 12:35 a.m., the guard approached the car and found a man, thought to be in his 20s, seated inside.

The guard asked the man what he was doing, whereupon the man, pipe in hand, brandished a handgun, and ordered the guard to the ground. The guard complied.

When he discovered the keys he had wouldn't start the car, the man ran from the area. The car was pushed 30 feet during the attempted theft.

Crime prevention pushed

Farmington Hills has created a crime prevention advisory committee to help pool ideas for combating break-ins, thefts, stickups, car thefts and other common crimes.

"We're not reacting to a particular situation. We're trying to improve our lines of communication in reducing crime," said Police Chief William Dwyer of Farmington Hills.

"The members will act as our eyes and ears and be liaisons between us and the groups they represent."

Eleven charter members of the Chief's Crime Prevention Advisory Committee met for the first time Friday in the Farmington Hills Police Facility Training Center.

Developing a future agenda followed discussions about the department's structure and crime prevention's evolution.

THE COMMITTEE, identified as a 1987 goal in the police department's five-year plan released earlier this year, will help investigators assure they're meeting the community's crime prevention needs. It also will help target areas in need of

more attention.

The committee will recommend crime prevention programs and potential target groups. It will buttress existing Business Watch and Neighborhood Watch programs.

Membership will grow to about 25 members, representing all facets of the city — businesses, subdivisions, industrial parks, school districts, civic groups, community groups. Meetings will be held monthly.

In addition, the committee may host periodic citywide meetings, including educational workshops on crime prevention.

Election Tuesday

Tuesday is election day for residents in the southeast portion of Farmington Hills.

The special election is being held to fill a seat for the Oakland County Board of Commissioners, 21st District, because of the death last August of veteran Democratic commissioner Alexander Perinoff.

Vying for the partisan seat are Democrat Lillian Jaffe-Oaks and Republican Douglas Sokolowski. Both are residents of Southfield, the majority city covered by the 21st district.

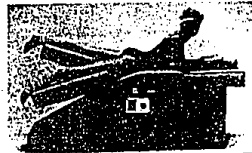
Farmington Hills voters in precincts 2, 4, 5 and 13 can cast ballots in Tuesday's election. In Farmington

Hills, the district includes an area from Eight Mile to 10 Mile roads, and from Inkster Road east to the city of Farmington boundary.

The vacant seat is one of 27 on the county board, which acts on proposals made by the county executive. The full term of office is two years; Tuesday's winner will serve the one year remaining in Perinoff's unexpired term. Annual compensation is currently \$16,089.

Polls will be open from 7 a.m. to 8 p.m. Qualified voters present and in line at the polls at closing time will be allowed to vote.
