On tap

Residents may face pressure concerns

The cloudy tap water noticed in some Farmington sinks this week should not concern residents, officials said Monday.

The water is safe to drink and use, but residents may have to live with discolored water until a water system change for 356 water existemer is operating fully in the next several weeks, city manager Robert Deadman told the city council Monday. The renovated system began operating Monday, when the city opened the valves. Higher pressures caused problems in the water system, Deadman said.

Water shot through the city's old system more quickly than before, causing tap water to become dirty and some lines to be damaged.

The pressure was previously 27 pounds per cubic foot; because of

Monday's system problems, officials decided to pull back and add water pressure slowly, at about 5 pounds per cubic foot each week. The system will eventually handle 50-80 pounds, according to Early Billing, the city's director of public services.

DEADMAN WARNED residents to be aware of leaking faucets and previously dormant pressure valves on hot water heaters. "Overflow valves, hot water tanks, some are

going to have to be replaced," Deadman and, "We're going to be operating \$5.70 pounds, Some of these old systems will fail. "We're hoping this won't occur, but the potential is there." Billing also warned water customers to adjust their lawn sprinklers so less water is used, but said residents will find their water bills increasing simply from household use. "They're going to use more because of the added pressure," he said.

A total of \$350,000 in water system renovations was approved in July 1986, giving several hundred Farmington water customers in the Grand River/Gill area an acceptable level of pressure. Payment to T & M Contractors Inc. of Auburn Hills

was approved Monday by city coun-cil, less a typical retainage amount, which is held until final cleanup is done and the project reviewed.

CITY OFFICIALS were concerned with low water pressure because of firefighting needs.

House construction in the areas of Whittaker Court also added to the problem, which was already president on Hillerest and Glenview streets. Although county health Gienticals require only 20 pounds of pressure per cubic foot, that apparently was not adequate for normal household use.

According to city engineers, the city's water pressure problems were due to the elevation of the water storage tank and the service area near the tank.

The proposed water district was removed from the Farmington water service district and added to the city's western high pressure service provided by the city of Farmington Hills. The additional water purchased through the Hills will cost Farmington about \$2,200 per year.
