

Hart campaign draws skepticism from local Democrats

 of Hart's decision to rejoin the party's election pack, which now has grown to seven. Other front runners include the Rev. Jesse Jackson and Massachusetts Gov. Michael Dukakis.

"I don't know what it's going to add to the race," Buccilli said. "We already have six people. If he was going to drop out, he should have stayed out."

Neither Breshgold nor fellow Farmington Democratic Club member and Farmington Hills councilman Aldo Vagnozzi were Hart sup-

porters in 1984 or in his recent efforts, both said.

"I was surprised he came back in," Vagnozzi said. "I think he has blown it as far as getting the nomination."

"He may have learned his lesson, but they'll keep badgering him all the way," Breshgold added.

In 1984, Hart carried the Farmington/Farmington Hills area in local caucuses by taking more than 50 percent of the vote, according to Vagnozzi. More than 1,500 residents came out to vote, he added.

"I'm not criticizing whatever may

have happened," Vagnozzi said of Hart's year of headlines. "Where he can be criticized is the way he handled it. He was not forthright in his responses."

VAGNOZZI SAID Hart's apparent attitude that he's the only one with any new ideas "borders on arrogance."

Hart's re-entry is "a big mistake," said Southfield club member Eric Coleman, who predicts that New York Gov. Mario Cuomo may become a candidate. Coleman, a Southfield school trustee, recently ran for

the vacant 21st District Oakland County Board of Commissioners seat, losing in the primary to Lillian Jaffe-Oaks.

"Politicians, they like that recognition, and he's been out of the limelight a few months. He's trying to put on that family front now," Coleman added.

Faxon said he doubted that Hart could return to favor with Americans, despite the lack so far of a strong candidate among the other six who are running.

"He still lacks the ability to gauge the sensitivity of the public," said Faxon. "He's shortchanging the American memory in his thinking he can bounce right back a few months later."

The senator added, however, that people do "tend to bounce back." Vagnozzi predicted Hart's campaign money will run out before the

comeback can gather momentum. "Hart's already in debt; he'll probably drop out in March or April anyway."

ACCORDING TO Buccilli, whose organization will be setting up six Southfield sites for the March 26 party caucus, the Democrats have a solid chance to win next November.

"If we don't shoot ourselves in the foot,"

The Farmington club will sponsor five caucus locations for the party caucus, club officials said. Breshgold predicted Hart may garner as much as 20 percent of the national vote.

"I'm sure he's got a hard core group of followers," he added.

Concurring with Vagnozzi and Faxon, none of the Democrats interviewed believe Hart has much of a chance at the nomination.

Coleman, a longtime member of

the Southfield Democrats. "We all have faults. What he did, he did, and that should be behind him. But it will always be paramount in voters' minds."

Coleman, who listed Jackson and U.S. Rep. Richard Gephardt of Missouri as good candidates, said there may soon be another candidate stepping forward — Cuomo — who would make people forget about Hart.

"I'll be watching Cuomo," Coleman said. "He's saying he's not running for president, but I question that because he's being very visible and vocal right now."

Faxon stopped short of calling Hart's decision to jump back into the election pool a disgrace.

"I think instead of exiting with a little bit of dignity, he is now going to be exiting with a far worse political rejection," Faxon said.

ed hospital room by 46th District Judge Eugene Friedman. A plea of not guilty was entered on behalf of Thomas, who will have his preliminary examination 9:30 a.m. Dec. 28 at 46th District Court.

Thomas had not been charged in the killing.

The chase began at about 2:30 a.m. Wednesday near Nine Mile and Telegraph, after a Southfield patrol unit spotted a speeding car, described over police radio as one belonging to the homicide victim, police said.

After Thomas lost control of the car and struck a fire hydrant near Nine Mile and Coolidge in Oak Park,

he attempted to elude the pursuing officer on foot.

The officer fired three shots, Conat said. One hit Thomas in the left hip and he was arrested. Surgery to remove the bullet was performed later Wednesday, and he was listed in stable condition Thursday.

The name of the police officer is being withheld pending the homicide investigation.

As an associate general counsel at
