10 named 'Good Citizen' by Quakertown DAR

The Daughters of the American Revolution (DAR) Good Citizen pin is rimmed with 13 stars representing the 13 colonies. The band of blue carries the name DAR Good Citizen.

The qualities of good character, which the DAR emphasizes — dependability, service, leadership and patriotism — are the titles of the four books in the center of the pin, suggesting school days.

Circling the books is the laurel wreath of honor. Behind the books is the torch of understanding.

Ten area high school seniors will be wearing the pin, chosen as Good Citizens by Quakertown chapter DAR, selected on the basis of their leadership qualities, their dependability, their service to the community and their patriotism.

Each becomes a contender for the title of Michigan DAR Good Citizen, and the one chosen for that award automatically becomes a contender for the National DAR Good Citizen title.

Those chosen by Quakertown DAR are Drew D. McDougall from Farmington High School, son of Stewart and Pat McDougall; Sean William LaHousse from Anderson High School, son of Connie LaHousse and Robert LaHousse; Scott Kay from Harrison High School, son of Calvin and Maureen Kay; Michelle Alexander of Harry S. Truman High School, daughter of Marian and Donald Alexander; Millicent W. Cramer, from North Farmington High School, daughter of Philip and Millicent Cramer.

The others are Crystal Marie Caruana of Mercy High School, daughter of John Thomas and Vicki Sue Caruana; Renee Marie Hardt of Romulus High School, daughter of Allen and Sallie Hardt; Michael Andrew Crnkovich of Our Lady of Mt. Carmel High School, son of Mary Jo and Richard Crnkovich; Rachel Fox from Temple Christian School, daughter of Robert and Martha Fox; and Kristopher Kyle Mavin from Plymouth Christian Academy, son of Ralph and Nanci Mavin.

McDOUGALL has served as student council senator, student council president, a Farmington School District student Round Table member, the Round Table president, a French Club officer-at-large, National Honor Society executive officer, president of Boys State State Board of Education, football and basketball captain.

He received the Time Magazine Man of the Year contest award in 1985, the Junior Varsity and Varsity Basketball Coaches Award, the Brykalski Coolman Award. He was named "Top Junior Student Athlete" and "National Merit Scholarship Commended Student. In the 1987-88 school year he won the Principals

Leadership Award.

He plans to attend University of Michigan and work towards a career in financial management. His dream is to play football in Michigan Stadium.

LAHOUSSE PLAYS on his school's football, tennis and swim teams while participating in National Honor Society and Honors Club activities.

His MEAP (Michigan Educational Assessment Program) score resulted in his being chosen as a National Merit Scholarship semifinalist. He will combine business and engineering studies in college to pursue a career in a space-related industry.

KAY is business manager and photography editor for the "Catalyst," Harrison High School's newspaper. He plays intramural basketball, is senior class president, member of the student council and captain of the varsity soccer team. He has been invited to Western Lakes Leadership Conference.

He holds a 4.0 average. He helped plant some of the gardens on the grounds of Farmington Community Center and helped start a garden at St. Vincent's Sarah Fisher Center as a volunteer in cooperation with Farmington Garden Club. He has not yet decided on his goals for a career.

ALEXANDER is president of SADD (Students Against Driving Drunk) at Truman High, the student government treasurer and editor of the school yearbook.

She headed up the decorations committee for the school's homecoming, Spirit Week and Christmas dance.

She has been on the school honor roll throughout her high school years. She hopes to make a career in social work.

CRAMER is captain of North Farmington High's varsity swim team, president of National Honor Society, vice president of the Student Round Table, on the varsity track team and participated in Girl's State.

After school hours she sits with a handicapped teenager, drives an elderly friend so she can complete her errands, tutors several high school students and serves on a voluntary board of directors that governs swimming in Michigan.

She hopes to pursue a career in international affairs.

CARUANA is a Eucharistic Minister at Mercy High School, a member of the Spanish Honor Society, treasurer for the National Honor Society and member of the Communications Council.

She is a student director for SEARCH, a Christian maturity retreat program, and has earned a varsity letter and attended national competition for her part in the school's forensic team.

She holds an award from American Association of Teachers of Spanish and Portuguese and the Academic Award in Language.

She also won the Catherine Repuc Memorial Scholarship for leadership, service and academic abilities, and is on Mercy's All Academic Team.

She has not yet decided on her career, but she does know she wants to work with and for people.

HARDT is president of the student government, editor of the yearbook, earned four varsity letters in track, and three varsity letters in cross country, and an academic letter three years running. She is involved in creating a health clinic at Romulus High. She

will attend Purdue University and study law. Her hope is to one day serve on the U.S. Supreme Court.

CRNKOVICH is student council president, has been a National Honor Society member for three years and is Congressional Youth nominee. He has won awards for the "American
