Cardio fitness: What does it mean?

Dear Myrna: Could you explain what "cardlovascular fitness" means? I've heard the term used a lot lately.

Good question!
Our cardiovascular system's endurance is defined as the capacity of the heart to deliver blood to our working muscles. The term cardiovascular fitness is simply a measure of our cardio capacity. One of the important elements of total fitness is the measurement of the ability of your heart and blood vessels to carry oxygen to your muscles. A fit person's lungs, blood vessels and muscles work much more efficiently and easily during exercise than do those of an unfit ocrson.

Cardiovascular litness can be determined in a few ways.

The most effective method used by doctors is the stress test in which you run to exhaustion on a treadmill or run up stairs. During this time important measurements are taken — your heart rate, amount of air you ventilate, amount of oxygen you consume and the amount of eartbon dixide you produce.

If you are interested in a detailed study of cardio fitness, I recommend you seeing a cardiologist.

Deer harvest record broken

Poaching complaints to the DNR's 24-hour Report All Poaching (RAP) phone hot line (1.800-292.7800) for the 1987 deer hunting season totaled 1,695 calls, slightly below last year's record 1,746 calls.

Overall, calls during the highest poaching period (September-November) this year are running 900 calls ahead of last year's figures.

HUNTING ACCIDENTS resulted in six deaths and 30 injuries during the recent liferarm deer season, according to preliminary figures released by the DNR.

These figures were up from the five deaths and 28 injuries reported last year, but slightly down from the

Based on roadside surveys of re-turning deer hunters, the Michigan Department of Natural Resources estimates a record 246,000 devere taken during Michigan's irre-arm deer season, Nov. 15-30. The old firearm deer harvest record was set in 1986 at 212,580.

Several other harvest records
were also broken.
In the Upper Peninsula (Zone 1),
hunters took 33,500 bucks, breaking
the old record, set 40 years ago, of
32,400.

32.400. The total harvest of 42,000 deer also set a new record. The old record of 39,220 was set in 1950. Athough no records were set, the northern Lower Penhania (Zone 2) once again recorded the highest deer harvest of any of the state's three zones at 119,000 deer, including 83,000 bucks. For Zone 2, the record firearm buck harvest was set in 1986 at \$7,400. The record in Zone 2 for the total deer harvest was set in 1952 at 141,410.

southern Lower Peninsula (Zone 3) continues to set records with a lirearm deer harvest of 57,000 bucks in a total harvest of 85,000

The previous firearm harvest record in Zone 3 was set in 1986 at 63,690 deer, including 44,180 bucks. Although the archery season runs through Jan. 1, 1988, indications

from the Oct. I-Nov. 14 half of the season suggests that archers will take at least as many as the \$8,000 deer taken during the 1986 archery deer season.

When combined with the firearm deer harvest, Michigan deer hunters will have taken more than 300,000 deer for the first time since state harvest records have been kept. The previous record was set in 1986 at approximately 277,000.

1985 season, in which six people were killed and 31 injured. 
