## CC wins Ohio meet

Redford Catholic Central successfully defended its title in the largest high school wrestling tournament in the state of Ohio. The Shamrocks won the 32-team invitational in Medina, Ohio, on Tuesday and Wednesday, Dec. 28 and 29, with one individual champion. Catholic Central's Lee Krueger won all five of his matches at 169 pounds by fall and was named the tournament's most outstanding wrestler. The Shamrocks will not be going back to defend their title next year, however.

A change in dates and format will prevent CC from scheduling the necessary two days to participate, but the Ohio teams that have played second fiddle to the Shamrocks will not be disappointed at the absence of the perennial Michigan power.


"In fact, they told us they didn't like us down there, they didn't want us to come back," CC coach Mike Rodriguez said. Krueger pinned Greg Reighard of Chandel at 1:35 in the final to complete the perfect tournament. That was preceded by falls over Kelly Fodor of Fremont (0:35), Tony Catalano of Solon (1:15), Matt Campbell of Ellyria (0:45) and Todd Reinbold of Lakewood (0:45). The Shamrocks' Matt and Jay Helm were runners-up at 130 and 125, respectively, and heavyweight Toby Heaton won the consolation final after losing to the eventual winner, Chris Commer of Toledo Rogers.
