


# Falcons rout Pats, Hawks

There was no stopping Farming-ton High as the Falcons ran their dual-meet wrestling record to 4-0 Thursday night. Farmington recorded 17 pins in the process of defeating Livonia Franklin 55-15 and Farmington Hills Harrison 63-3 during a double dual in its own gymnasium.

The event was scheduled as a quadrangular meet with North Farmington also taking part, but it ran late and the coaches decided to cut short the scales.
