No smoke tax for Oakland until late '89

oakland County will see no money for two years from the new taxes rejarcites mokers are paying.
And it will see next to nothing of the three-county hotel taxes that are being used to expand Detroit's Cobin (tail).
"My people are asking 'what are you doing with all that cigarteit tax money?" said Commissioner Ruel McPherson, D-Hazel Park, as the county board's general government committee discussed the effect of new state taxes.

The panel strugged as it learned from staff intembers how little new revenue there would be.

TAKE THE CIGARETTE tax increase of four cents a package, often labeled a "Wayne County ballout."
Chairman Richard Skarritt, R-Milford, said, "Wayne gets it all (\$33 million) in 1988. Other counties won't get anything until October of 1999. It will be almost two years before any (clgarette tax increase revenue) comes back."

Joseph Mullen, the board's legislative agent, said the other \$2 counties will get a total of \$17 million once Wayne's debts are paid off. Oakland is due for \$2.5 million — about \$2.46 per person in a county of 1.1 million.

The new law says the revenue "Is to be used for property tax relief unless county commissioniers decide to spend the money for jails, yoult facilities, court costs or health care."
