

Hawks get taste of swim success

Farmington Hills Harrison dunked Livonia Franklin 90-71 in recording its first boys swim victory of the season against three defeats Thursday.

Brian Fitzgerald and Scott Farabee won two individual events each to lead Harrison.

Fitzgerald's time of 1:54.19 gave him first place in the 200-yard freestyle, and he clocked out at 5:08.45 to gain top honors in the 500 free. Farabee captured the butterfly in 56.89 and the backstroke in 1:01.93.

Fitzgerald and Farabee also were part of Harrison's medley relay team, which placed first with a time of 3:24.28. Other members of the team included Marc Froesch and Jason Barringer.

Harrison won three other individual events. Jeff Whitehead placed first in the 50 free in 23.26, Carl Johnson scored 22.30 points to win the diving competition and Froesch took the 100 free in 51.66.

STEVENS ON 103, N. FARMINGTON 69: Western Lakes power Livonia Stevenson won eight events Thursday to overpower the Raiders.

The Falcons also got first places from Scott Hawkins in the backstroke (1:02.64) and Brad Moore in the breaststroke (1:09.77).

The Rockets, however, won both relays with times of 1:52.07 in the medley and 3:35.4 in the freestyle. In addition, Joe Bush won the diving with 210.7 points and Chris Pryor the individual medley with a 2:12.81 time.
