'Simulator' Takes Wheel

"Simulated Driver Education" that will cut down hours of driving time while recreating actual driving hazards on film will be introduced into Farmington public schools beginning next semester.

School board officials approved the measure at a special meeting Monday night after witnessing the installation of the Link model driver simulator machine in the Livonia school system.

SCHOOL ADMINISTRATORS said the present six-hour driving time requirement would be cut to three hours with 10 hours in the driver simulator and classroom training.

William Prisk, business manager for the school system, said the new simulator would save \$10,000 in teacher salaries since the student-teacher ratio for simulator is 16 students for each teacher. The Link simulator system will cost \$31,750.

ADDITIONAL SAVINGS on gas, oil, insurance and service by the reduction in required cars is another plus factor for the simulator. Prisk said. Eleven cars will remain in service out of the present 22.

John M. Washburn II, school board president, added the new simulator system will probably be installed "by the second semester" at Harrison High School and will serve 1,500 students from Harrison, Farmington and N. Farmington High Schools.

Students not attending Harrison will be bused to the new driver education classes.

Ways To Help Curb Pollution

The Keep Farmington Beautiful Committee has recently become involved with the local and state interest in environmental quality control.
- Much has been written regarding what industry can do to improve air, water, and noise pollution but the whole spectrum of environmental control goes far beyond these three areas.
- The Keep Farmington Beautiful Committee will offer suggestions periodically to area residents and businesses in order to inform the public of ways to do its part to improve our environment.
- The following are a few suggestions which have been passed on to the committee:
1. For short distances, use public transportation when possible instead of your car.
 2. Consider purchasing a small car if you must drive.
 3. If you commute to work, fill up your car. One car carrying four persons emits only 25% as much pollution as four cars carrying only one person.
 4. Use less electricity. Turn off excess lights. Fewer plants are big polluters.
 5. For just a few grocery store purchases, taken your own reusable tote bag. Cut down on use of paper bags and wrapping paper.
 6. Do not burn leaves or trash. Start a mulch pile for your garden for any organic matter. Excess leaves and trash can be placed in plastic bags for regular pick-up by the Department of Public Service.
