

Farmington shocks unbeaten Canton

Farmington High School began a new basketball season Tuesday night.

After winning only one of their first seven games, the Falcons got a much-needed shot in the arm with a sturning, 63-60 victory over previously undefeated Plymouth Canton.

"It's got to do an awful lot for our confidence," Farmington coach Bob Kaump said.
"The confidence level has to be unbellevable." It told (the players) all along we've got some talent and just hail to put it together. If this doesn't do it, I don't know what will."
