

Value your cable studio time

What does your 7:30 studio time mean? The time given you by the television staff is the time you can expect to have access to the studio and control room. Our television facilities are in demand for multiple functions and are tightly scheduled.

There are many times, however, when the studio proper is sitting unused as the control room is functioning for editing. If this is the case, then showing up a few minutes before your scheduled time is fine to begin setting up your props, set and turn on your lights. Staff members may be busy helping another scheduled resident until your scheduled time. Please be patient as the one-on-one attention will be yours, too.

Many studio shoots accomplish a finished product. However, there are times when mistakes or b-roll may need to be edited later. Schedule right away for a two-hour block of editing time. There are two editing suites available for your use.

Once editing is completed, be sure to log your tapes. Our channel quality depends upon the accurate information that you, the producer/editor, write on the log sheet.

Finally, schedule your show on channel 12. Staff members will do their best to serve your needs. This means take into consideration when the audience you want to see the program most likely will view the channel.

Then, call me. Tell me all the details. Your program is so special. Let us help you publicize it. Now be sure that your guests, crew, affiliated organization know when to watch the program. As a clock goes full circle, so is our program and its resources. You are what makes it tick. Please take advantage of this opportunity.

Services held for Hills veteran photographer

Sandy Friedman, 41, died Monday, Jan. 18. Services in his memory were held yesterday.

A native Detroit, Mr. Friedman lived in Farmington Hills. He was a professional photographer for 23 years and delighted in recording significant life moments for the brides, bar mitzvah boys and others he captured on film.

Shortly after his own bar mitzvah, he began working for photographer Leo Knight and learning photographic techniques in a home darkroom. Mr. Friedman, who always enjoyed working with young people, put a camera in the hand of his younger brother, Gary, when he was just 14. Years later, when his brother was a staff member on the Southfield Eccentric, Mr. Friedman inserted a display ad congratulating his brother on his achievement and awards.

While just starting out as a professional photographer, Mr. Friedman

man hired Harriet Schechter to assist him, and later they were married. Together, they built their business, Friedman Photos, which Mrs. Friedman will continue.

MR. FRIEDMAN attended the Detroit Institute of Technology and Walsh College, but those experiences taught him that photography was his life, family members said.

He was a member of the Professional Photographer's Association and active in the North Farmington, West Bloomfield Little League. He enjoyed coaching youngsters in little league as he had been coached years ago. He was president of the organization.

Mr. Friedman was a longtime member of Congregation Shaarey Zedek whose rabbi, Irwin Groner, officiated at the services in his memory.

He is survived by his wife, Harriet (Schechter), a daughter, Lisa; a son, Scott; and two brothers Marc of Rosedale, N.Y., and Gary of
