The 12,000-square-foot facility will house a teacher-deucation program and a children's learning center.

The center, built as an addition to the college's Administration Building, cost more than \$1.2\$ million and took nine months to complete.




It primarily serves the tri-county area and offers bachelor's and associate's degrees in more than 50 academic areas.
