**● MOONLIGHT SKI TOUR**  
Something new and different is awaiting you. Cross country ski beautiful Heritage Park by moonlight on Friday, Feb. 5, 7-10 p.m. No prerequisite is required and there is no fee for this special event. Ski rental will be available. Individuals should meet at the ski center at Heritage Park.

TO THE QUALIFIED ELECTORS OF FARMINGTON PUBLIC SCHOOL DISTRICT, A CONSTITUENT SCHOOL DISTRICT OF OAKLAND SCHOOLS, AN INTERMEDIATE SCHOOL DISTRICT, OAKLAND COUNTY, MICHIGAN:

NOTICE IS HEREBY GIVEN, that a special election will be held in Farmington Public School District, County of Oakland, and State of Michigan, on Tuesday, the 9th day of February, 1988, for the purpose of submitting the following proposition:

Shall the previously voted increase in the limitation on the total amount of general ad valorem taxes which may be imposed for all purposes in any one year upon real and tangible personal property in the Farmington Public School District, County of Oakland, State of Michigan, as provided in Section 6 of Article 9 of the Constitution of the State of Michigan, in the amount of five and three-fourths (5 3/4) mills on each dollar (\$5.75 per \$1,000) of state qualified valuation, which is about to expire, be renewed and continued for a period of ten (10) years, from July 1, 1988 to June 30, 1998, to be used for defraying a portion of the operation expenses of the school district, and that said renewal be levied in 1988, if authorized, without regard to the millage reduction required by Section 31 of Article 9 of the State Constitution?

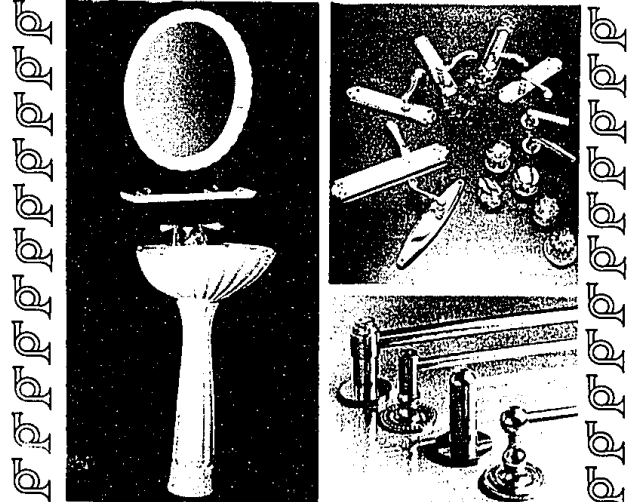
There is evidence that diet and cancer are related. Follow these modifications in your daily diet to reduce chances of getting cancer:
