11 laid off at Botsford

BOTSFORD HAS recently completed major construction projects, including an additional hospital wing, new units and physicians offices. But Cooper said the costs involved have not forced the hospital board to cut personnel.

"When we brought new services on line, it challenges us to bring aboard care givers in specialties we didn't have before," Cooper said. "We're downsizing in some areas, yet in other new areas, we're aggressively recruiting."

Some of the hospital's new services include new inpatient physical

medicine and rehabilitation and geropsychiatric units and new cardiac monitoring equipment for critical care.

Plans also are in the offing to expand the hospital's emergency department. By spring, the new cardiac catheterization lab is expected to be opened.

"As each department and service is examined and restructured, new systems and procedures will be in place to assure our goal of quality, cost effective operation," Cooper said.

THE DECISION to begin a review of hospital operations was accompanied with a hiring freeze in August.

With each person who decided to resign or retire, his position was studied "to determine whether we needed it," Cooper said. In addition to layoffs, the hospital has eliminated some benefits, such as hospital-furnished administrative cars and a change in the sick-day program, he said.

In their review, hospital officials are looking at the hospital's service area, the kinds of patients admitted and the type that must be transferred.

Mercy sister to go overseas

Sister Maurita Sengelaub, a member of the Religious Sisters of Mercy order based in Farmington Hills, heads overseas this month to develop a system of Catholic hospitals throughout Australia.

In accepting the two-year assignment, Sister Sengelaub will take a leave of absence from her current role as senior advisor to Mercy Health Services, also based at the Farmington Hills campus at 11 Mile and Middlebelt. Her interim title will be project director.

The project "will help to strengthen the health care institutions" in Australia, she said.

She will work with provincial leaders of the Sisters of St. John of God in Perth, who currently own nine independently operated hospitals in Australia and two in Pakistan. She will also work as a consultant with other Mercy sisters in that country.

Sister Sengelaub has been in the health care field for 40 years. She previously served as president of the

Livonia-based Mercy Collaborative, a subsidiary of MHS, and is a past president of Catholic Health Association.

She is also a former director with the National Migrant Worker Council and the board of Pope John XXIII Center for Medical Moral Research and Education.

Last June, Sister Sengelaub received the Mutual of America Distinguished Service Award, an award honoring her for her life of service to others.
