

History Room opens door to past

Edgar Rollin Bloomer — founder of Farmington's first newspaper, the Enterprise, 100 years ago — would feel right at home here.

The Farmington Community Library Michigan History Room not only boasts 1,600 publications about Michigan, Oakland County and Farmington, but also an original collection of the Enterprise and Its successor, the Enterprise & Observer, from 1900 to 1975.

The room received a big boost two years ago when Farmington Hills Historical Commission member Kathryn Briggs donated hundreds of new and rare books about Michigan history. The donation was appraised at \$11 non.

Both groups have donated such historical documents as 12st ledgers, photographs and leather post cards. Both groups will begin an inventory review of room materials Saturday.

"I just think it's a real resource for Farmington and southeast Michigan," said Farmington Historical So-

ciety president Steve Olson, who lives in the historic Royal Aldrich House in Farmington Hills. Genealogy bulfs can tap eight vol-umes of the Passenger and Immigra-tion Lists Index and many volumes containing Michigan and Oakland County biographies.

THE ROBERT B. Cook Historical Collection of Farmington History provides information about local familles — weedding announcements, obituaries, biographies, historical events and land transfers — from

"Few cittes have had such indepth study of its founders, landmarks and historical events," said Beverly Papa), library director.
Librarians make it a point to include the room on school tours "so children can see a room devoted to the history of Farmington," Theeke said.
