Elusive suspect frustrates area police in rape cases

Area police say they're just as frustrated as residents at the nine sexual attacks in Birmingham/Bioomfidd, est. Bloomfield and Farmington Hills haven't been

solved.

A community meeting at Birmingham Scaholm High School Feb. 3 brought hundreds of area residents out to hear police and a social worker talk about sexual of-fenders and how to avoid them.

The session followed the Jan. 26 rape of a 17-year-old girl at her home in northwest Birmingham, the nith sexual attack since April in Birmingham, Bloomftield Township, West Bloomfield and Farmington Hills.

Hyatt Eby, president of the Bloomfield Township United Homeowners Association, said it was "a horrble meeting.

"Here they've got an audience of kids wanting to know how they were going to get a rapist off the streets, and they're giving them a clinic on rape," Eby said.

IN RESPONSE, Bloomfield Township Lt. Jeffey Wenner said: "We certainly can feel for their frustration. Actually, we're just as frustrated. We wish we lad an answer, but we don't have the answers."

Birmingham police refused to comment, other tian saying the investigation is continuing.

Eby criticized the meeting a format and criticized police for not finding the attacker. He had organized a question/answer rally with police last spring when the attacks started.

Although he didn't have official approval, Eby pledged a \$2.500 reward on behalf of the township homeowner's group and challenged Birmingham's homeowners groups or city commission to match hat reward to bring it up to \$5.000, for information leading to the conviction of the rapid.

"One of the poor ladies who was attacked called me the other night and thanked me for what I'd done," Eby said.

THE ATTACKS may or may not be connected. Police aren't sure.
Common links in descriptions include that he wears a ski mask and carries a knife. He apparently stalks his victims before assaulting them. He is described as white, about 5 feet 11, with a thin to medium build. Many of the victims have also been robbed. Some evidence indicates these might be individual incidents, "maybe more so" after the recent event, Werner said.
"I'm not going to conclude they are all done by the same person," he said.

CHIEF WILLIAM Dwyer said Farmington Hills po-lice are committed to working as part of a task force with Birmingham, West Bloomfield, Bloomfield Town-ship and Franklin police to identify and arrest the rapist or rapists.

"We're meeting and sharing information constantly,"
Dwyer said. "It's a priority investigation with us because of the viciosness of the attacks against two of
our residents on Thanksgiving night."
Two Farmington bills women in their 20s were raped
in a house in oorthwest Farmington Hills on Thanksgiving night by a knife-wielding man wearing a ski mask.
He had broken into the house earlier that night and later
left with cash and a musical keyboard.

The Oakland County Chamber of Commerce Silent Observer Program is offering a reward of up to \$1,000 for information that leads to a conviction in any of the sexual attacks. Tip givers can remain anonymous.

Just call the police in the area where the crime oc-curred and identify yourself as a silent observer. They will tell you how to proceed. If your tip leads to the arrest and conviction of the felon, you may be eligible to receive a reward.
