Good Citizen pins and certificates will be presented to each of the six winners of the Good Citizen Award by Irene Foster, chapter Good Citizens Chairman. Three Flags Chapter's 1988 Good Citizen Award winners are Julie Komorn of Southfield-Lathrup High School, Shella Lynn Cunningham of Southfield High School, Stacy Sanders and Jessie Micham both of Pelletier High School, Pam Hughes of Huron High School, Tricia Ann Smith of Decker-ville High School and Heather A.
