Family firms rarely survive

AP — Family squabbles and a re-luctance to show favoritism cause few family-owned firms to survive for the second generation, according

for the second generation, according to a survey released recently.

Many family-owned businesses are characterized by emotion and rejection of practices that frequently guide public corporations, according to the study.

"All (family members) are paid the same regardless of their contribution, (and) all get stock whether they're involved in the company or not — there's an imposition of love and family values," according to family business consultant Benjamih Benson, who conducted the survey.

Making the family business a public corporation, by selling stock, can save the firm, he said.
