American Center Properties is planning a 100-acre, 15-year development in the burgeoning northwest section of Southfield.

The first phase of the project is a proposed three-story, 312-unit apartment complex on 18 acres on the north side of 11 Mile between Inkster and Franklin roads.

The Southfield Planning Commission will consider the site plan for the development by Lincoln Properties on Feb. 24. The firm has a contract to buy the land from American Center.

ERWIN ZIEGELMAN, general partner of Hall American Center As-

sociates Limited Partnership and American Center Properties, said the concept of the master plan is to build a pyramid with the existing, 25-story American Center Tower as the focal point.

The plan includes a new 20-25-story office tower, a 20-25-story hotel, a convention center, retail stores and restaurants, eight-12-story office buildings and three-six-story office-research facilities.

Planners are reviewing the master plan, expected to take 15 years to develop.

The Southfield City Council last year approved a massive, \$50 million, long-range traffic and road improvement plan to make way for mushrooming growth in the area bounded by 11 Mile, Telegraph, Ink-

ster Road and the north city limits north of 12 Mile.

Included in the plan is a new connecting road between 11 and 12 Mile, which would ease traffic on Inkster Road and provide for an interchange east of Inkster to the I-696 expressway.

ANOTHER 106 ACRES of land in the 12 Mile-Franklin Road-4966 area calls for construction of 1,000 units of multifamily housing in apartment and condominium projects along with cluster single-family developments.

Property to the south of American Center is zoned for single-family homes. A 240-unit apartment complex is being built to the west.
