# Big S'fld complex planned

American Center Properties is planning a 100-acre, 15-year devel-opment in the burgeoning northwest section of Southfield.

The first phase of the project is a proposed three-story, 312-unit apartment complex on 18 acres on the north side of 11 Mile between link-ster and Franklin roads.
The Southfield Planning Commission will consider the site plan for the development by Lincoln Properties on Feb. 24. The firm has a contract to buy the land from American Center.

sociates Limited Partnership and American Center Properties, said the concept of the master plan is to build a pyramid with the existing. 2-story American Center Tower as the focal point. The plan includes a new 20-25-sto-ry office tower, a 20-25-story botel, a convention center, retail stores and restaurants, eight-12-story office-research facilities. Planners are reviewing the mas-

Planners are reviewing the mas-ter plan, expected to take 15 years to

ter plan, expected to take to year and ordevelop.

The Southfield City Council last year approved a massive, \$50 millilon, long-range traffic and road improvement plan to make way for mushrooming growth in the area bounded by 11 Mile, Telegraph, Ink-

ster Road and the north city limits north of 12 Mile. Included in the plan is a new con-necting road between 11 and 12 Mile. which would ease traffic on likster Road and provide for an interchange cast of Inkster to the 1-695 express-way.

ANOTHER 106 ACRES of land in the 12 Mile-Franklin Road-1-696 area calls for construction of 1,000 units of multifamily housing in apartment and condominium projects along with cluster single-family developments.

Property to the south of American Center is zoned for single-family homes. A 240-unit apartment com-plex is being built to the west.
