

Why are local bass anglers so excit-driven because Bass-a-rama is coming to the Waterford Community Center March 4-6. The reason for all the excitement is because bass season opens nearly two months early this year ...well, sort of.

Through pressure and support from the Michigan Bass Chapter Federation (MBCF) and the Michigan Hesources submitted a proposal for a catch and release bass season to the Natural Resources commission. The NRC approved the proposal intalting an early bass season for catch and release (or no kill) bass fishing on six southern Michigan lakes, including three in Oakland County.

The DNR will keep a close eye on the activity on each of the lakes through the use of a creed census and interviews with anglers and lake property owners.

The regular bass scason remains the Saturday before Memorial Day (May 28 this year) to Dec. 31 on non-trout streams and inland lakes. The season runs the Saturday before Memorial Day to Sept. 30 on trout streams and designated trout lakes and the third Saturday in June to Dec. 31 on the Detroit and St. Clair Rivers and Lake St. Clair.

tournaments," said Borer, "With two people in each boat, 30-40 boats and each boat salving for two or three days, it provides quite a boost to the local economy. Maybe the State of Michigan realized this and wanted to keep some of those fishermen home."

Regardless of the reason, the decision was made and bass anglers will be able to enjoy an extended season for the next five years.

"The basic idea is that there will be no real harm to the fish," said Ron Spiller, fisheries biologist with the DNR. "Many bass fishermen use catch and release tactics year round anyway. The Bass Fereration and the MUCC promoted the idea and we decided, why not.

This ailment is a heel of a problem

Dear Myrna: I have a pain at the bottom of my foot. I've been to a doctor — he calls it plantar fascilis. I've already heard his lengthy description. Can you describe it simply?

Being that I'm not a doctor. I can only describe it in simple terms. We have what is called plantar fascia - a band of tough connective tissue that supports the bottom of our feet. It starts at the base of your toes, runs along the bottom of your foot and attaches on a spot on the middle bottom of your heel bone.

The pain that your are feeling is usually due to the tearing a way of the band where it attaches on the heel. This is called plantar fascitis. I'm sure the doctor has told you to rest your feed.

It will take some time to heal. Have patience.
