"North Farmington wrestler Zaim Lummany seems to do.

The 198-pound junior, who was second in the individual district tournament on Saturday, Feb. 13, won the regional championship. Insi Saturday at Clio High School.

Cummalaj will be seeded among the top four wrestlers in his weight class when the Class A state finals are contested Saturday at the Keliogg Center in Battle Creek.

"Zaim wrestled the best he has ever wrestled," said North coach Dick Cook, adding Cummalaj defeated a wrestler who had become the No L-ranked wrestler in the state

In his second regional bout, Cummalaj pinned Traverse City's Mike Nadlicki in 138, and it was Nadlicki who had defeated Utica's Mark Hunter, considered the best in the state, earlier in the season.

Nov's Breit Keir, Redford Catholic Central's Lee Krueger and Cummaloj figure to be among the favorites, atong with thunce, at the state finals. Cummalsj has beaten Keir, who upset Krueger to win the regional at Plymouth Salem.
Farmington will be represented at the state meet by Rob Woodbeck, who was fourth in the 132-pound division at the Salem regional.

An astounding seven won regional championships — a record even for a school laden tradition in the sport—while the other two were consolation winners.


"Going into the day, we didn't have any one sure thing," Salem coach Ron Krueger said.
