

Harrison, North swimmers succeed

North Farmington got double-wins from Bruce Goins, Jordy Greenstein and Steve Turney Tuesday in whipping Westland John Glenn 108-64 in swimming.

North Farmington won both relays. Goins, Greenstein, Turney and Dan Knipper took the 200 medley relay (1:47.21), while the team of Chuck Chuba, Doug Schwedland, Keith Mahle and Knipper teamed to win the 400 free relay (3:28.78).

The individual competition had Greenstein winning the 200 IM (2:11.30) and the 100 breast (1:04.99), Turney the 50 (23.99) and the 500 (5:09.83) free, and Goins the 100 fly (57.66) and the 100 back (1:03.64). Chuba finished first in the 100 free (53.86).

FARMINGTON HILLS Harrison defeated Livonia Churchill 91-81 in a Western Division dual meet Monday.

The two teams split the relays, Harrison winning the 400 free relay behind Marc Froesch, Jeff Whitehead, Brian Fitzgerald and Scott Farabee (3:28.27), while Churchill won the 200 medley (1:51.5).

Ex-area star establishes 4 swim records

Bruce Howell, a former Farmington Hills Harrison swimming standout, set four 30-and-over world records in the United States Long Course Masters Swimming Championships in Woodlands, Texas.

Howell, who went on to star at Eastern Michigan University after high school, won three breaststroke events covering 50, 100 and 200 meters with record times of 29.81, 1:06.87 and 2:26.81, respectively. He also won the 200 individual medley in 2:15.1.

"I'm swimming better times now than when I was in college. I must be a late bloomer," Howell quipped.

Howell was one of six former athletes to be inducted into the EMU Hall of Fame in 1986 and the first swimmer to be so honored.

After graduating from EMU in 1979, Howell taught physical education in Long Beach, Calif., where he was a swimmer/coach for the Belmont Shores Masters Club. Masters swimming was designed to inspire swimmers to remain competitive after college.

While at EMU, Howell captured seven Mid-American Conference individual championships and swam on two MAC championship relay teams. His 200-yard breaststroke record, set in 1977, still stands atop the EMU record book.

Howell, who received his inspiration as a swimmer from Mark Spitz' multiple gold-medal performance in the 1972 Olympics, took up swimming in his junior year at Harrison. He was eighth in the state in the breast that year and won the state championship as a senior.

Rice helps Spartans tie Rice

Paul Rice made 28 saves Saturday, earning Livonia Stevenson a 2-2 tie with Birmingham Brother Rice in a game played at Oak Park Computer Ice Arena.

Stevenson is now 14-3-2 overall, while Rice is 13-8-1.

Rice held a 2-1 lead through two periods before Stevenson's Gordie Wilson tied it up midway through the final period on assists from Lee Genovese and Rick Beck.

The same line teamed up for the Spartans' first goal during the opening period of play — Beck from Wilson and Genovese.

"Our goalie made some nice saves," said Stevenson coach Matt Mulcahy of his junior netminder. "Both teams missed some good chances in the last period."

"We didn't play well in the second period (Rice score twice). It was a hard-checking game."

REDFORD CC 5, A.A. HURON 4: On Saturday, the Shamrocks increased their record to 14-3-3 and 10-1-1 in the Michigan Metro league with a narrow win over Ann Arbor Huron in a game played at the Redford Ice Arena.

Five Catholic Central players scored: Kris Slocum, Scott Lock, Jim Hubenschmidt (power play), Bill Balfy (short-handed) and Jason Baldas.

Double-winners for Harrison in individual events were Farabee in the 200 free (1:50.30) and the 100 fly (56.43), and Whitehead in the 50 (23.90) and 100 (50.60) free.

Carl Johnson took the diving (227.50 points), Fitzgerald won the 500 free (5:01.54) and Chad Hughes captured the 100 back (1:03.75) for the Hawks.

Churchill's Jeff Peterson was the winner in the 200 IM (2:16.60).

Harrison boosted its record to 6-5.

Council awarded the contract for Oakland, Thomas, Warner Streets and Parking Lot Paving to four bidders Boco Services, Inc., in the amount of \$200,215.55. Public comments were heard.

The following ordinance was adopted:

ORDINANCE NO. C-555-88

AN ORDINANCE TO AMEND THE CODE OF THE CITY OF FARMINGTON BY ADDING NEW SUBSECTIONS WHICH NEW SUBSECTIONS SHALL BE DESIGNATED AS PARAGRAPHS (2) OF OPTION A AND OPTION B OF SECTION 1.242 OF CHAPTER 9, TITLE I

THE CITY OF FARMINGTON ORDAINS:

Option A. 100% Survivor Pension.

(4) During the joint lifetime of the retired member and designated beneficiary, the retired member is paid a reduced pension. Upon the death of the retired member during the lifetime of the designated beneficiary, the designated beneficiary is paid the full amount of the reduced pension until death. Upon the death of the designated beneficiary during the lifetime of the retired member, the retired member is paid the unreduced straight life pension until death.

Option B. 50% Survivor Pension.

(2) During the joint lifetime of the retired member and designated beneficiary, the retired member is paid a reduced pension. Upon the death of the retired member during the lifetime of the designated beneficiary, the designated beneficiary is paid one-half (1/2) of the reduced pension until death. Upon the death of the designated beneficiary during the lifetime of the retired member, the retired member is paid the unreduced straight life pension until death.

This ordinance was introduced at a regular meeting of the Farmington City Council on February 1, 1988, was adopted and enacted at the next regular meeting of the City Council on February 15, 1988, and will become effective ten (10) days after publication.

CITY OF FARMINGTON HILLS SUMMARY OF PROCEEDINGS REGULAR CITY COUNCIL MEETING FEBRUARY 22, 1988

Mayor Soronen opened the regular meeting of the Farmington Hills City Council on February 22, 1988 at 7:30 p.m. Members present: Mayor Soronen, Mayor Pro-Tem Sever, Alkatech, Dolan, Fox, Marks, and Vagnuzzi. Others present: City Manager Costick, City Clerk Reynolds, Assistant City Manager Call, Director of Public Services Blaisell, and City Attorney Bibeau.

Council approved the agenda, as amended.

Council reviewed an audiovisual presentation and discussion regarding hospital emergency room closings.

Council adopted a resolution endorsing participation by the Farmington Community Library in the plot M-LINK information network proposed by the University of Michigan.

Council considered request for attendance at Annual Congressional City Conference in Washington, D.C., March 19-22, 1988.

Council approved appointments and reappointments to various Boards, Commissions, and Committees.

Council adopted Traffic Control Order No. SG-35-1988, installation of a traffic signal at the intersection of Nine Mile Road and Drake Road, and rescinded a portion of Traffic Control Order No. 1.A.2. requiring Drake Road traffic to stop at Nine Mile Road.

Council awarded traffic signal installation and modernization project to Harlan Electric Company for the amount of \$35,000.75; authorized the City Manager to issue a purchase order to the Oakland County Road Commission for timing set-up and installation inspection at intersections of 13 Mile/Drake Road and 13 Mile/Halsted for an amount not to exceed \$4,000.00; adopted Traffic Control Order No. SG-35-1988 (installation of a traffic signal at intersection of 13 Mile and Halsted Road); Traffic Control Order No. SG-35-1988 (installation of a traffic signal at intersection of 13 Mile and Drake Road); and, rescinded a portion of the following:

Traffic Control Order No. 1.A.16 (requiring north and southbound Halsted Road traffic to stop at 13 Mile Road).

Traffic Control Order No. 1.A.1. (requiring north and southbound Drake Road traffic to stop at 13 Mile).

Traffic Control Order No. ST-127-1985 (requiring all east and westbound 13 Mile Road traffic to stop at Drake Road).

Council adopted Traffic Control Order No. RPR-1-1988, prohibiting parking or standing at all times along west side of Broadway Plaza Shopping Center from the northwest corner of the building to a point 150 feet south.

Council adopted resolution approving revision and increase in water system service connection charges.

Council agreed to hold executive session immediately following the meeting to discuss pending litigation, labor negotiations, and property acquisition.

Council agreed to waive bid requirements and authorized City Manager to issue a purchase order to Day and Night Heating & Cooling Co. of Farmington Hills for conversion of two (2) boiler furnaces to natural gas and installation of one (1) 50 gallon gas hot water heater in the amount of \$5,800.00.
