## School staff gets 7-percent raises

Non-union Farmington school employees will receive a 7 percent across-the-board raise in the com-

across-the-board raise in the comlag year.

That is the same percentage given to the employees last year, according to deputy superintendent
Michael Flamagan.

The increases are for 28 people
and represent about 375,000 to the
district, he supervisors, executive
secretaries and the district's three
assistants superintendents. Three
administrative assistants will
receive slightly more than 7 percent, he sald.
Several school board members

said they wanted to assure that
evaluations of supervisory level
personnel are done in the coming
year, and at least one said she
wants to link them to pay raises in
future years.

THE MATTER was discussed at a school board linance committee meeting March 1 and a recommendation approved at the regular board meeting that followed.

"There was a big hassle a year ago on this board about evaluations," said trustee Jack Cotton, who initially raised the question. He was assured by superintender Graham Lewis and Flanagan that evaluations will be done.

"Our intent is to do a yearly evaluation," Flanagan added.
"I think in the future, I would like to see us approach evaluations and raises simultaneously," trustee Susan Rennels said. "I understand the situation this year. but it's something that needs to be explored."

The issue was initially raised during the selection process for a new superintendent during the summer of 1986, when trustees agreed they wanted to implement some type of evaluation system. The suggested evaluation system to include secretarial or clerical staff included in the group of 28, tewis said.

FRANKLIN RESIDENTS were stunned in February when they learned that an investigation was under way by the prosecutor's office and that Sgt. David had been suspended with pay while it was being pursued.

Thompson said the investigation was initiated on complaints of other Franklin officers who said citations and arrests they had made were not being processed.

Glomb and Verdon said Tuesday after the issuance of the warrants that David would continue on suspension, but without pay, until the conclusion of the case.

Among the cases against David are the names of prominent Franklin

residents, including one council trustee and the son of another.

David is alleged to to have destroyed without being asked a traffic citation issued by another Franklin officer against Dewey Fraser Benson, the son of council trustee Dewey Benson.

He is also charged with failing to file a traffic accident report made by council trustee Karen Katz with the state police as required by law.

THOMPSON SAID the alleged "favors" for Benson were "totally unsolicited." In fact, the two trusters didn't know anything about it until the recent investigation, he said. "I reported my fender bender to police and to my insurance company," Katz said Tuesday. "I don't know how he felt he could benefit me

by doing it."
"I wan't aware of it and I wan't on the council at the time," said trustee Benson about his son's clation. "My son had just graduated from colege and want looking for anything special.
